### **Background**

The Han people have inhabited their traditional territory in the central western Yukon and eastern Alaska for several thousand years. Their lands span the Yukon River from the mouth of the Stewart River to the mouth of the Klondike River, including Yukon River tributaries back to their headwaters.

The Han's first contact with European people occurred between the late 1700s and the 1840s at the time when Russian and Hudson Bay fur traders were founding trading posts. As explorers, missionaries, and prospectors began to move into the Territory, the Han moved closer to trading posts and missions.

In 1887, a townsite was established at the confluence of the Yukon and Klondike Rivers on what was originally the site of a summer fish camp. The discovery of gold in 1896 brought thousands of prospectors and grubstakers. By the turn of the century, this influx had pushed the aboriginal people from their village at the mouth of the Klondike River to the Moosehide Reserve, three miles from Dawson City.

Moosehide and the surrounding area was designated a reserve in 1902. In the late 1950s the declining population in Moosehide caused the Han people to move to Dawson where they have become an integral part of the community. Today Moosehide is used mainly as a summer camp and traditional ceremonial area. The city's population is 2,151 according to June 1997 figures. First Nation members make up approximately 28% of the population.

### **Land Claims and Self Government**

The Tr'on Dek Hwech'in First Nation is currently negotiating Land Claims and Self-Government Agreements.

### **Health Care**

Health care is provided by the Community Health Centre, Monday to Friday. The centre also provides after-hours emergency service and ambulance dispatch. Two doctors and one dentist have practices in Dawson City.

### **Social Services**

Other community social services include the Yukon Family Services Association, the Housing Corporation, a YTG Health and Social Services social worker, a probation officer, and the Dawson City Women's Shelter, which provides 24-hour-a-day shelter. The Tr'ondek Hwech'in First Nation offers social services to its members, including counseling, court assistance and support through the Native courtworker services, social assistance, adult care, and homemaker care. There is a Community Education Liaison Coordinator.

### **Police/ Fire**

Policing is provided by a RCMP detachment of one sergeant and four constables. Fire and ambulance services are provided by a volunteer service, 25 strong, with members trained in first aid and CPR. This service operates within town limits.

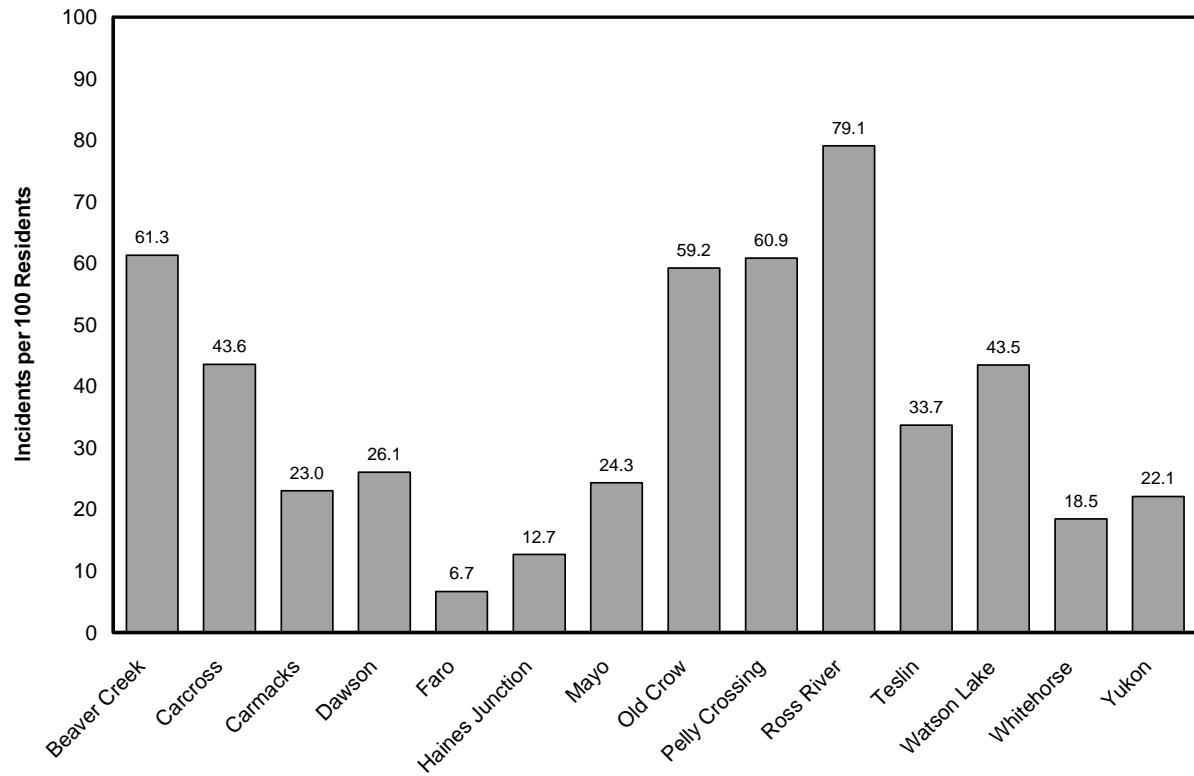
