The following statistics are from the 2001 Census of Canada which occurred on **May 15, 2001.**

Labour Force


In the Yukon, the Aboriginal population's unemployment rate is more than double that of the overall Yukon population. For the week prior to the latest Census, May 15, 2001, the unemployment rate for Yukon Aboriginals was 26.8% compared with 11.6% for the total Yukon population. **Education**

Income

Median household income for Yukon Aboriginals was \$39,614 for 2000, while the overall Yukon figure was \$51,930.

The overall rate for Yukoners aged 25 and over without a high school graduation certificate was 19.8%, while the rate for Yukon Aboriginals was 33.5%



Notes

There are many ways of defining the Aboriginal population, which can result in different estimates of its size. There is no single or "correct" definition of the Aboriginal population and the choice of a definition depends on the purpose for which it is to be used. Different definitions/counts are used depending on the focus and requirements of the user. For the purposes of this report, **Aboriginal Identity** was used.

Aboriginal Identity refers to those person who reported identifying with at least one Aboriginal group, i.e. North American Indian, Metis or Inuit. Also included are individuals who did not report an Aboriginal identity, but did report themselves as a Registered or Treaty Indian, and/or Band or First Nation membership.

Participation, Employment and Unemployment rates refer to the number of persons employed in the week (Sunday to Saturday) prior to Census Day (May 15, 2001), expressed as a percentage of the total population 15 years of age and over.

Total income refers to the total money income received during calendar year 2000 by persons 15 years of age and over.

Median income of persons 15 years of age and over is that amount which divides their income size distribution into two halves, i.e. the incomes of the first half of the persons are below the median, while those of the second half are above the median.

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation definition of an **Aboriginal household** has been used for the household and occupied private dwelling characteristics for the Aboriginal Identity population.

An Aboriginal household is defined as follows:

- any single-family household where at least one spouse, common-law partner or lone parent is considered part of the Aboriginal identity population;
- any multiple-family household where at least one of the families in the household is an Aboriginal household (as defined above); and
- any non-family household where at least 50% of the household members are considered to be part of the Aboriginal identity population.

Additional statistics from the 2001 Census are currently available, including population, dwelling counts, language, mobility, migration, citizenship, immigration, ethnic origin, labour force activity, occupation, place of work, mode of transportation, unpaid work, school attendance, education, highest level of schooling, earnings, religion, shelter costs, income and social and economic characteristics of individuals, families and households.



Please Note: The majority of figures shown in this publication have been subjected to a confidentiality procedure known as "random rounding" in which counts are rounded to a multiple of "5" which may cause sums not to equal totals.
