
### Police-reported Crime Statistics in Yukon

This report is based on data released by Statistics Canada from the incident-based Uniform Crime Reporting Survey (UCR) . The UCR collects information on all criminal incidents (of adults and youth) reported to, and substantiated by, Canadian police services.

#### Highlights:

- A total of 9,447 criminal incidents were reported to police in Yukon in 2013: 1,509 violent Criminal Code violations; 3,477 property crime; 533 Criminal Code traffic violations; 3,647 'other' Criminal Code violations; and 281 Federal Statutes violations.
- Yukon's 2013 police-reported crime rate of 25,741 incidents per 100,000 population, was 13.9% higher than the 2012 rate.

#### Crime Rate, Canada, Provinces and Territories, 2013




- Yukon's 2013 crime rate was the third highest in the country at 25,741 incidents per 100,000 population.
- In 2013, the overall crime rate increased 13.9% compared to 2012. However, the 2013 crime rate was only 2.4% higher than the 2004 rate.

Crime counts are based on the most serious offence in an incident; however, violent criminal incidents are generally counted separately for each victim. Criminal Code traffic offences, as well as federal statute violations are not included in the calculation of the overall crime rate.

### Criminal Code Violations (excluding traffic), Canada, Provinces and Territories, 2013

- In 2013, there were 8,633 actual incidents of Criminal Code violations (excluding traffic) in Yukon. This total consisted of: 1,509 violent Criminal Code violations (ranking Yukon the fourth lowest in Canada at 17.5%); 3,477 property crime (ranking Yukon the second lowest in the country at 40.3%); and 3,647 'other' Criminal Code violations (ranking Yukon the highest in Canada at 42.2%).\*
- The above Yukon proportions compare nationally at: 21.0% violent Criminal Code violations; 60.6% property crime; and 18.3% 'other' Criminal Code violations.



\* While `other' Criminal Code violations typically include counterfeiting, weapons violations, child pornography, prostitution, disturb the peace and administration of justice, etc., these `other' violations for Yukon mainly included disturb the peace and administration of justice.

Crimes against the person involve the use or threatened use of violence against a person, including homicide, attempted murder, assault, sexual assault and robbery. Robbery is considered a crime against the person because unlike other theft offences it involves the use or threat of violence.

In April 2011, legislation came into effect making it an offence to traffic in property obtained by crime, including possession with intent to traffic property obtained by crime.
In January 2010, the UCR survey was modified to create new violation codes for identity fraud and identity theft. Prior to 2010, those offences would have been coded as fraud.


Property crimes involve unlawful acts to gain property, but do not involve the use or threat of violence against the person. They include offences such as break and enter, theft and fraud.



These incidents involve the remaining Criminal Code offences that are not classified as violent or property (excluding traffic offences). Examples are mischief, bail violations, disturbing the peace, arson, prostitution and offensive weapons.


### Number of Incidents by Violation Type as a Percentage of Total Criminal Code Violations (excluding traffic), Yukon, 2004-2013



- While the majority of Canadian jurisdictions have seen a general upward trend in violent Criminal Code violations as a percentage of total Criminal Code violations, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Yukon, and the Northwest Territories have seen the opposite. For Yukon, the percentage had an overall declining trend between 2004 and 2008, increased between 2008 and 2011 and then decreased in 2012 and 2013.
- Over the past ten years, violent Criminal Code violations have averaged 18.9% of all Criminal Code violations in Yukon, the fourth lowest in the country.
- In 2013, there were 985 incidents of assault levels 1-3 in Yukon, accounting for 65.3% of all violent Criminal Code violations. Collectively, uttering threats (241), threatening or harassing phone calls (107), and criminal harassment (45) accounted for 26.0%. Sexual assault levels 1-3 (73) accounted for 4.8% of all violent Criminal Code violations.



- Yukon has experienced a downward trend in property crime as a percentage of all Criminal Code violations. With the exceptions of Prince Edward Island and the Northwest Territories, all other jurisdictions experienced a similar downward trend.
- On average over the last ten years, property crime has accounted for 45.4% of all Criminal Code violations in Yukon, the second lowest in the country. In 2013, the percentage of property crime in Yukon (40.3%) was the second lowest in Canada.
- In 2013, there were 1,914 incidents of *mischief* accounting for 55.0% of all property crime in Yukon. *Theft* (1,191) accounted for 34.3% of all property crime, and *breaking and entering* (215) accounted for 6.2%.



- With the exceptions of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, the majority of jurisdictions have seen an upward trend in other Criminal Code violations as a percentage of all Criminal Code violations.
- While Yukon's average 'other'
  Criminal Code violations percentage ranks highest in the country (35.7%) over the last decade, disturb the peace incidents have accounted for 70.3% of that figure.
- In 2013, there were 2,538 incidents of disturb the peace accounting for 69.6% of all 'other' Criminal Code violations in Yukon. Administration of justice violations incidents (951) accounted for 26.1%.



The number of actual incidents refers to the total number of incidents reported to the police minus incidents proven to be unfounded following preliminary investigation in any given year. Policereported statistics may be affected by differences in the way police services deal with minor offences. In some instances, police or municipalities might choose to deal with some minor offences using municipal by-laws or provincial provisions rather than Criminal Code provisions. Differences in Police service's priorities, policies, procedures and enforcement practices may also have an effect.

Prior to the 2012 Police-reported Crime Statistics in Yukon report, Yukon Bureau of Statistics' crime publications contained microdata obtained directly from the Yukon RCMP office. Records management systems changed in 2004 and the publication was discontinued. Community-level data is now available via Statistics Canada CANSIM tables 252-0051 and 252-0082. As a result of these changes, the 2012 report and this publication (2013) are not comparable with previous ones.

Populations are based upon July 1 estimates from Statistics Canada, Demography Division.
