## GDP by Industry 2010

### Highlights:

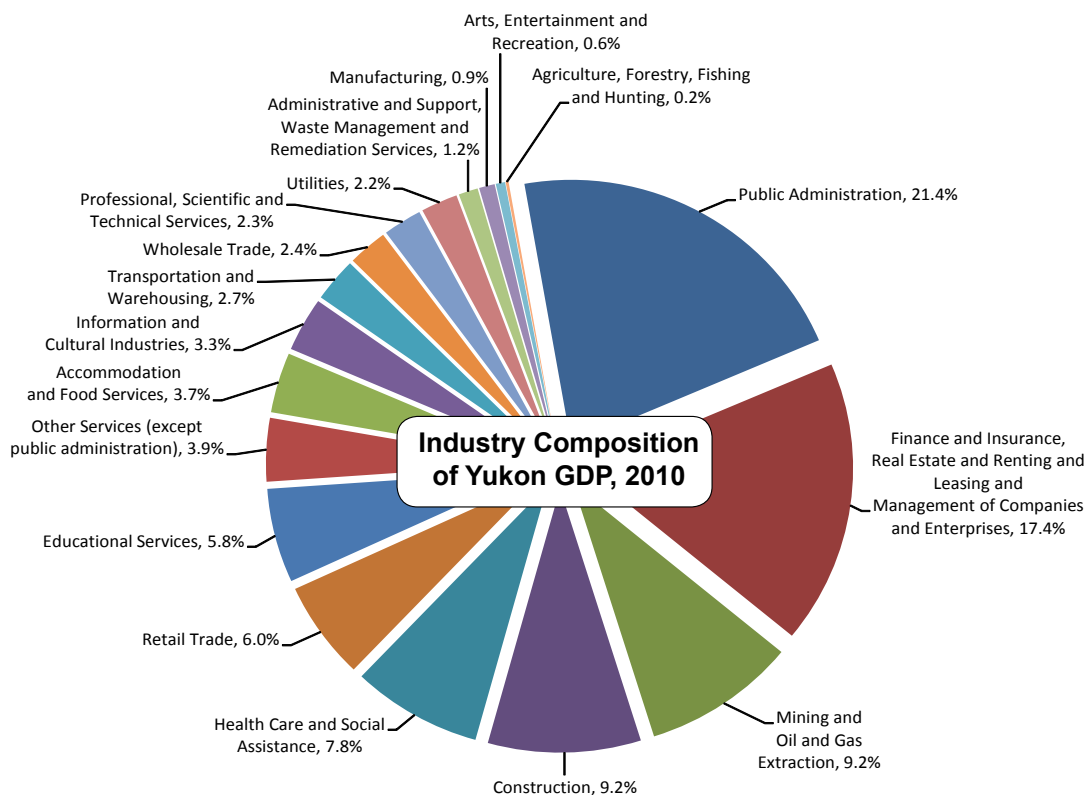

The gross domestic product (GDP) of an industry represents the value added by labour and capital in transforming inputs purchased from other industries into output. This analytical report presents Statistics Canada's latest estimates of Yukon's real GDP by industry in chained 2002 (inflation-adjusted) dollars for 2005–2010 and Nominal GDP by industry in current (not adjusted for inflation) dollars for 2005–2008. The figures are subject to revision.

GDP is one of the primary measures used by decision-makers, financial and other institutions to evaluate the health of the economy. An increase in real GDP is interpreted as a sign that the economy is doing well, while a decrease indicates that the economy is not working at its full capacity. Real GDP is linked to other macro-economic variables such as employment, economic cycles, productivity and long-term economic growth.

Yukon's GDP by industry (at basic prices in chained 2002 dollars) rose 4.0% in 2010 after a revised increase of 5.7% in 2009.

In 2010, the largest dollar value increase was seen in the *Construction* sector with an expansion of \$31.9 million, up 27.6% from 2009. The largest dollar value decrease was in the *Mining and oil and gas extraction* sector, with a contraction of \$9.0 million, 5.7% down from 2009.

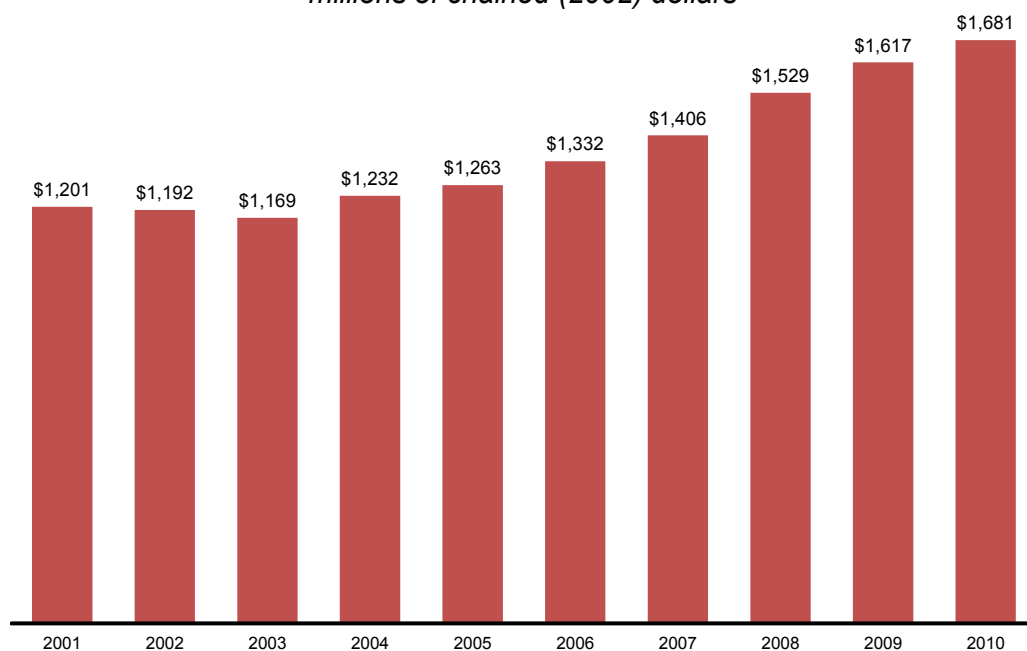

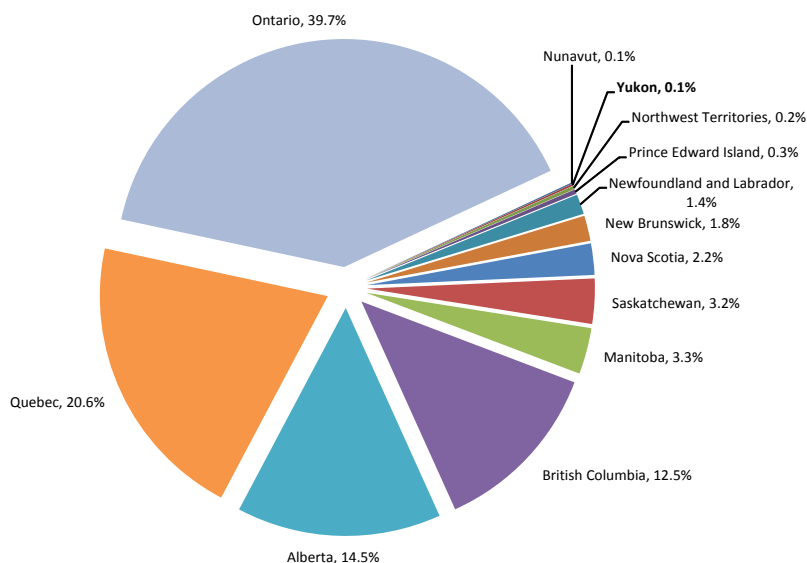

Statistics Canada has adopted the chain Fisher volume index method of calculating the inflation-adjusted, or real, gross domestic product (GDP). The reason for the adoption of this method is twofold: it produces the most accurate measure of growth in GDP and its components; and the change brings the Canadian measure in line with the US quarterly Income and Product Accounts which also use the chain Fisher formula to measure real GDP. Use of the chain Fisher index has also been recommended by the United Nations "System of National Accounts 1993", chapter 16.

An important consequence of using chain indexes is that the associated volume measures are not additive. That is, the sum of the chained values for each component of an aggregate does not equal the chained value of the aggregate. For example, the sum of the components of the Transportation & Warehousing Industry is not equal to the number given for that industry, just as the sum of the individual industry sectors is not equal to the number given for All Industries.

All of the GDP estimates in this publication are measured in basic prices.

*Note on the definition of the Public Administration Industry:* Economic units (companies or establishments) are classified together in the same industry if they are engaged in the same or a similar kind of economic activity. The industrial grouping does not depend upon whether the activity is carried on by a government agency or by a business enterprise. Because so much of the activity commonly understood as 'government' is reallocated and assigned to its related industrial group in the industrial distribution, the 'Public Administration' industry shown in these tables provides a limited view of the full range of government activity. It includes only those establishments of government which clearly do not belong to any other branch of economic activity, but which are essentially concerned with general administration, the internal service agencies of the public sector, and defence.

*\*The most recent year for which the input-output structure of Yukon's economy is measured is 2008 and therefore it is the most recent year for which the contributions of different industries to GDP may be accurately measured. GDP calculations for subsequent years are projections based on the structure of Yukon's economy in 2008 and changes in prices and output volumes in intervening years. Due to the volatility of mineral prices, and the development of new mines since 2008 that have dramatically changed the amount and contribution of mineral production in Yukon, estimates of Yukon mining GDP in 2009 and 2010 may not accurately reflect the contribution of mining to Yukon's economy.*
