

## Household Spending in the Yukon 2003

### Introduction

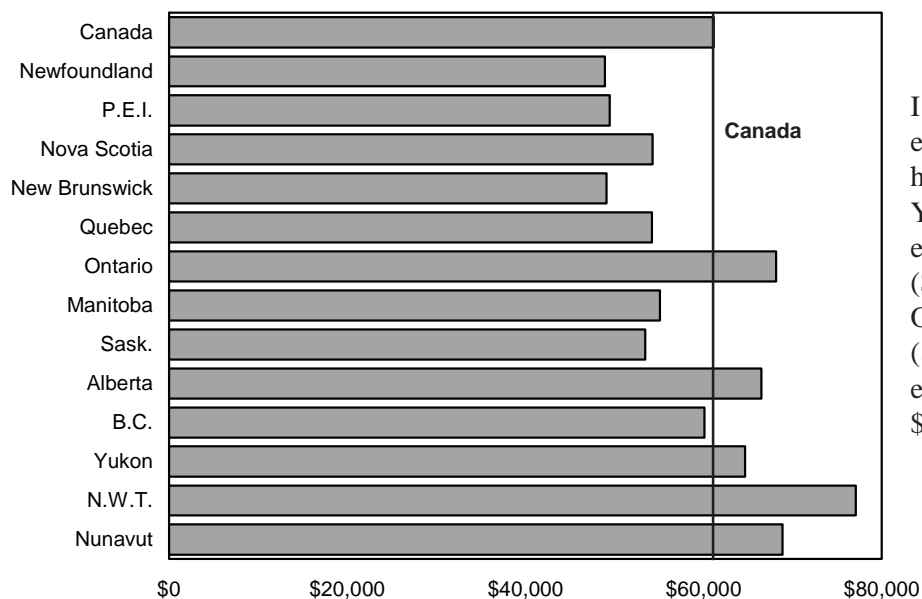
This report presents the results of the 2003 Survey of Household Spending (SHS), conducted January through March 2004 by Statistics Canada. Information about the spending patterns, dwelling characteristics and household equipment of Canadian households during 2003 was obtained by asking people in the ten provinces and three territories to recall their expenditures for the previous calendar year. The focus of this report is on spending patterns in the Yukon, but comparisons with other Canadian jurisdictions are also included.

The Survey of Household Spending collects information that is broadly comparable to the former Family Expenditure Survey (FAMEX) and the Household Facilities and Equipment Survey, but there are several noteworthy differences. SHS is annual for the provinces but conducted every second year in the territories, to reduce response burden on the small population base of the territories. FAMEX was conducted nationally every four years. The SHS

sample is fifty percent larger, but the number of detailed expenditure categories is smaller in an effort to reduce response burden. Another major change is that SHS reports results for Whitehorse and the Yukon, whereas FAMEX reported results only for Whitehorse.

The first section of this report highlights total expenditures, comparing spending in the Yukon with Canada and the other provinces and territories. The second section compares national spending patterns with the Yukon, in order to show differences in spending in the Yukon versus the rest of Canada. The next section provides a historical comparison of spending in Whitehorse from 1982 to 2003, showing how spending patterns have changed over time. The last section provides a detailed list of spending in the Yukon from the 2003 Survey of Household Spending. The results of the SHS reveal how households in the Yukon spend their money and are an indication of the economic and social well-being of Yukoners.

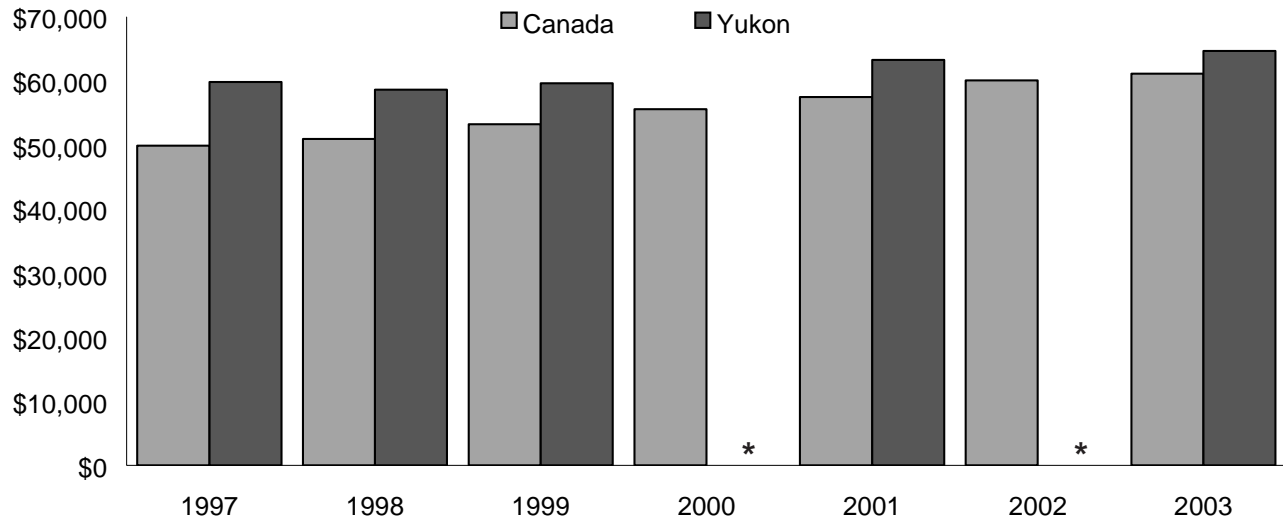
**Average Total Expenditures**



In 2003, the average total expenditure by Yukon households was \$64,675. The Yukon was fifth in total expenditure, behind the NWT (\$77,073), Nunavut (\$68,841), Ontario (\$68,118) and Alberta (\$66,489). The average total expenditure in Canada was \$61,152.

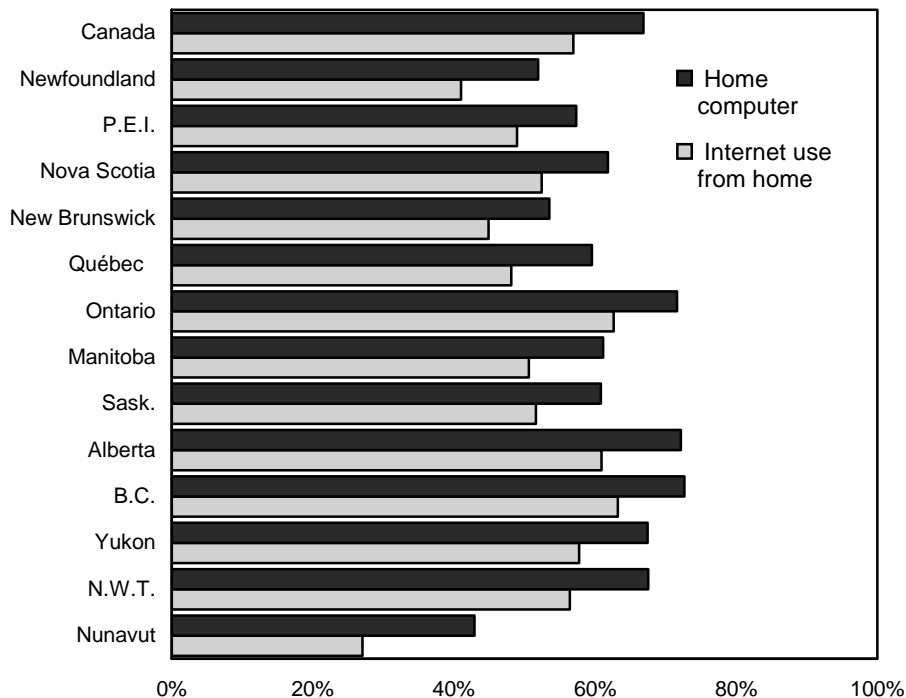
## Average Household Spending, Canada and Yukon, 1997 - 2003

\* In 1998, 1999, and every second year thereafter starting with 2001, statistics for Canada include the territories. For the other years, Canada-level statistics include the ten provinces only. Data for the territories were collected in 1997, 1998, 1999, and every second year starting with 2001.

## Percentage of Households with Home Computers and Internet Use From Home, Canada, Provinces and Territories, 2003



The Yukon ranked fifth in Canada for the percentage of households with home computers, and was fourth in internet use from home. British Columbia was first in both categories at 72.6% and 63.2% respectively.

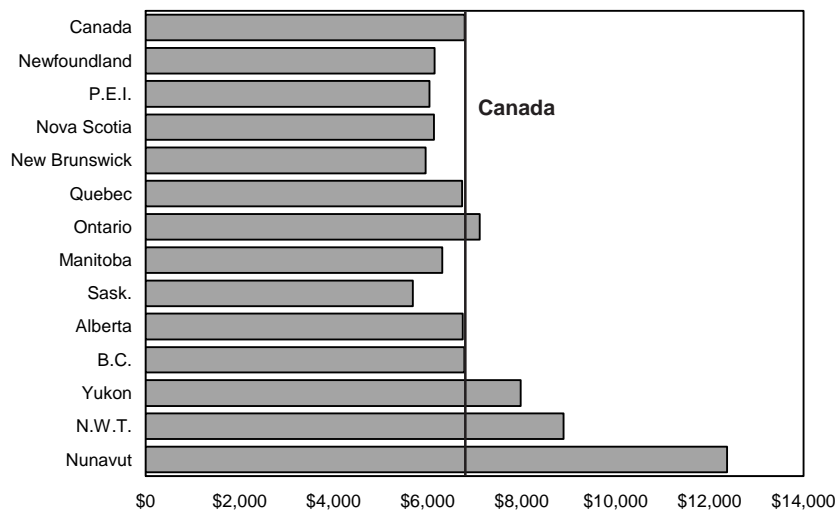
- 67.4% of households in the Yukon have home computers, compared with 66.8% of households in Canada.
- 57.7% of households in the Yukon use the internet from home, compared with 56.9% of households in Canada.

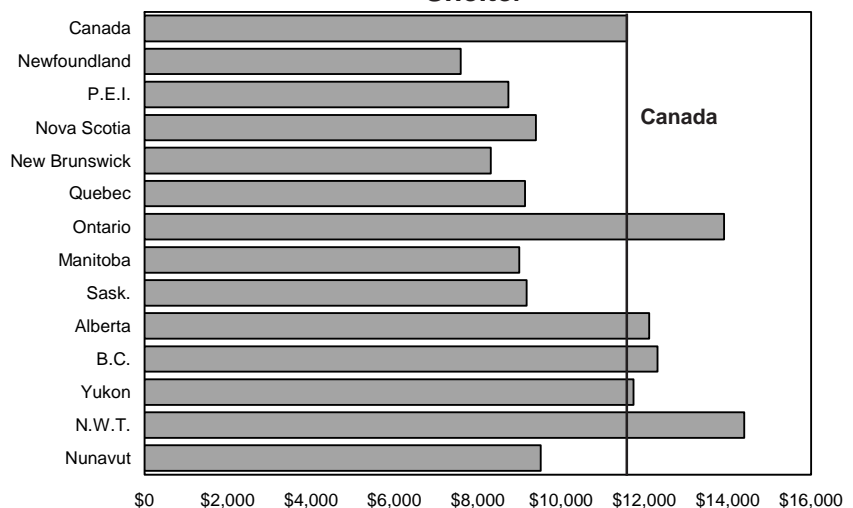
## Food



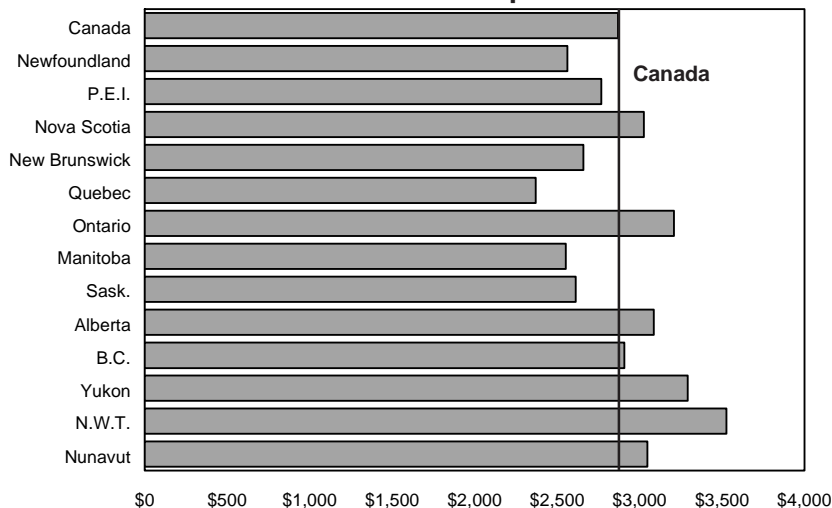
In 2003, the average expenditure on food by Yukon households was \$7,979. The Yukon was the third highest in spending on food, behind Nunavut (\$12,376) and the N.W.T. (\$8,893). The average expenditure on food in Canada was \$6,791.

In 2003, the average expenditure on shelter by Yukon households was \$11,738. The Yukon was the fifth highest in spending on shelter, behind the N.W.T. (\$14,398), Ontario (\$13,913), B.C. (\$12,314), and Alberta (\$12,118). The average expenditure on shelter in Canada was \$11,584.

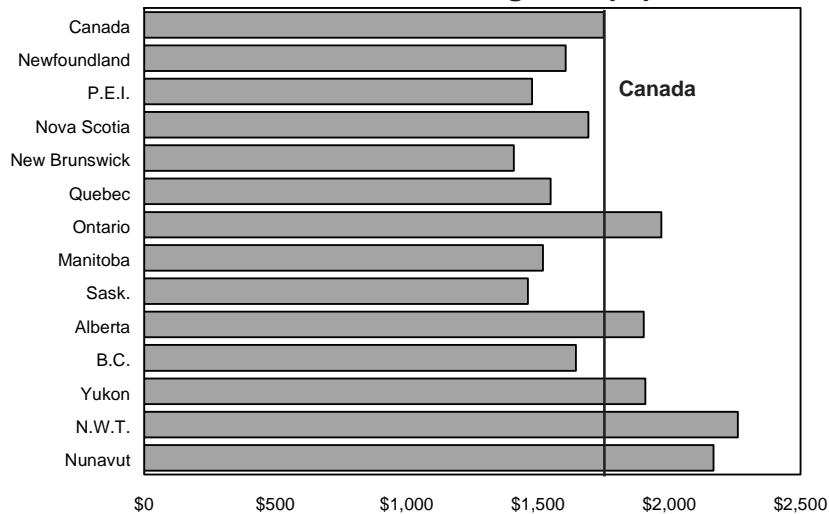
## Household Operation



In 2003, the average expenditure on household operations by Yukon households was \$3,292. The Yukon was the second highest in spending on household operations, behind the N.W.T. (\$3,527). The average expenditure on household operations in Canada was \$2,870.

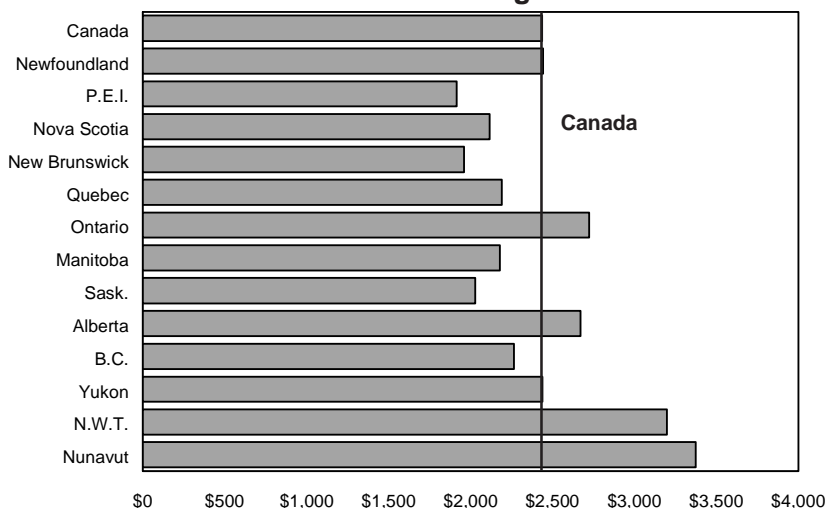
## Household Furnishings & Equipment



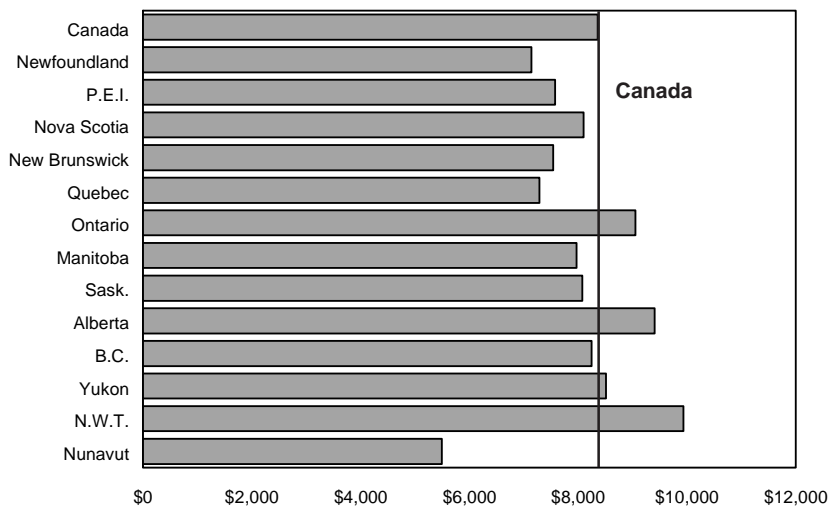
In 2003, the average expenditure on household furnishings and equipment by Yukon households was \$1,910. The Yukon was the fourth highest in spending on household furnishings and equipment, behind the N.W.T. (\$2,262), Nunavut (\$2,169) and Ontario (\$1,970). The average expenditure on household furnishings and equipment in Canada was \$1,751.

In 2003, the average clothing expenditure by Yukon households was \$2,439. The Yukon was the sixth highest in clothing spending, behind Nunavut (\$3,374), the N.W.T. (\$3,199), Ontario (\$2,723), Alberta (\$2,672) and Newfoundland (\$2,442). The average clothing expenditure in Canada was \$2,436.

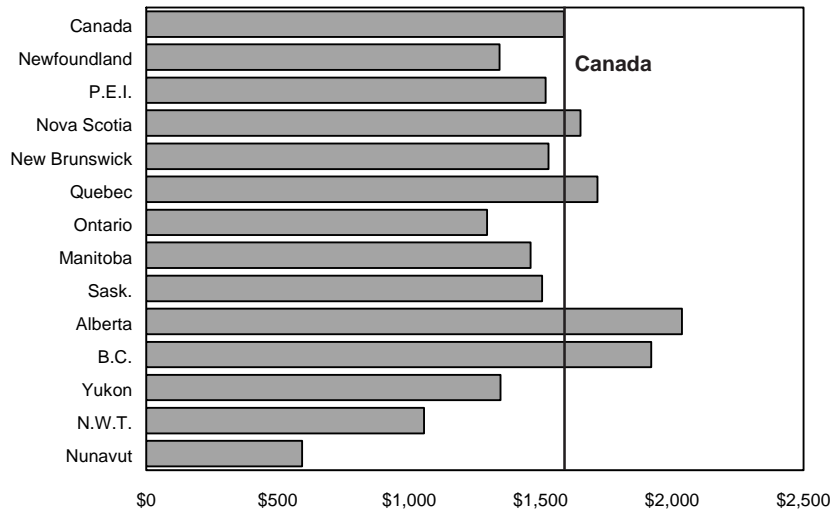
## Transportation



In 2003, the average expenditure on transportation by Yukon households was \$8,510. The Yukon was the fourth highest in spending on transportation, behind the N.W.T. (\$9,934), Alberta (\$9,405) and Ontario (\$9,051). The average expenditure on transportation in Canada was \$8,353.

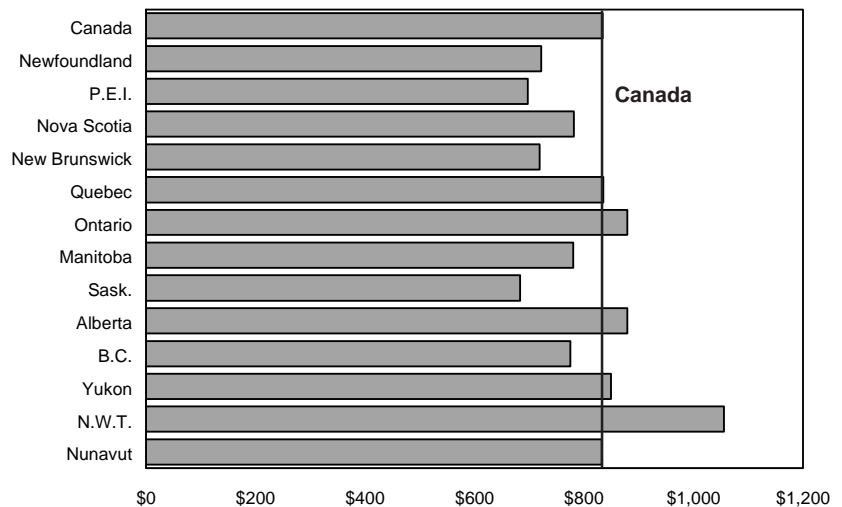
## Health Care



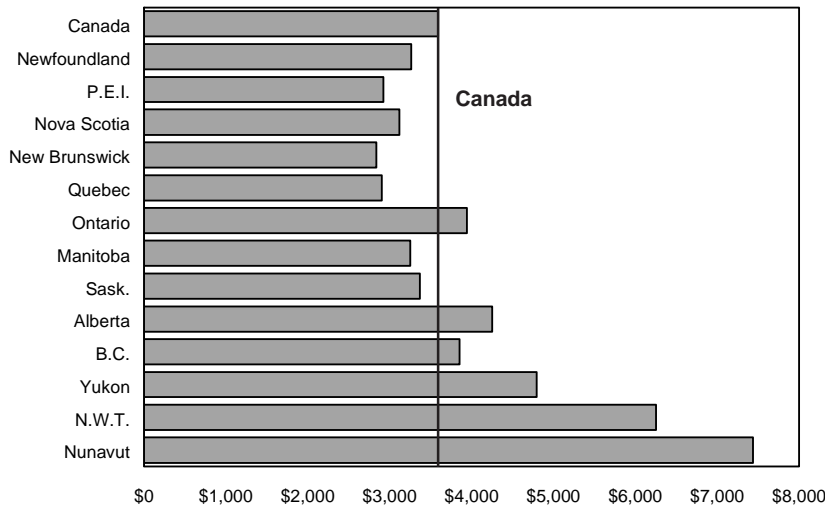
In 2003, the average expenditure on health care by Yukon households was \$1,347. The Yukon was *fifth lowest* in spending on health care, with only Nunavut (\$593), the N.W.T. (\$1,057) Ontario (\$1,297) and Newfoundland (\$1,344) being lower. The average expenditure on health care in Canada was \$1,588.

In 2003, the average expenditure on personal care by Yukon households was \$849. The Yukon was the fourth highest in spending on personal care, behind the N.W.T. (\$1,055), Alberta and Ontario (\$879 each). The average expenditure on personal care in Canada was \$834.

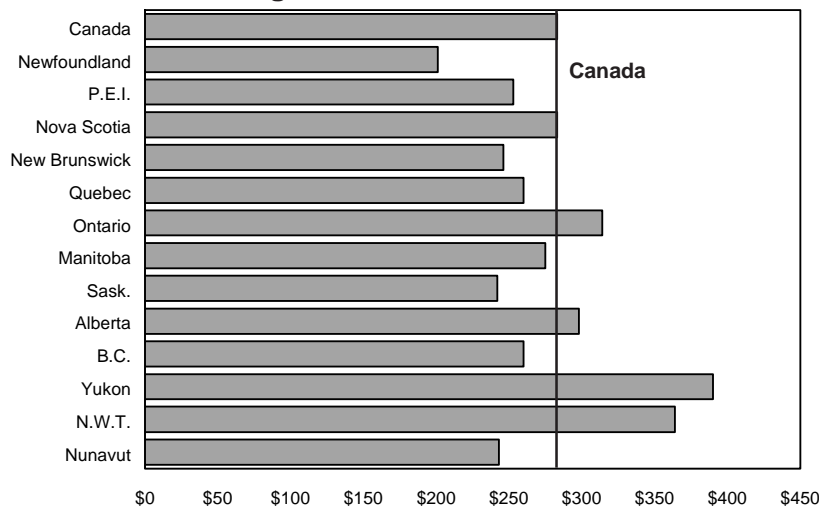
## Recreation



In 2003, the average expenditure on recreation by Yukon households was \$4,794. The Yukon was the third highest in spending on recreation, behind Nunavut (\$7,437) and the N.W.T. (\$6,251). The average expenditure on recreation in Canada was \$3,591.

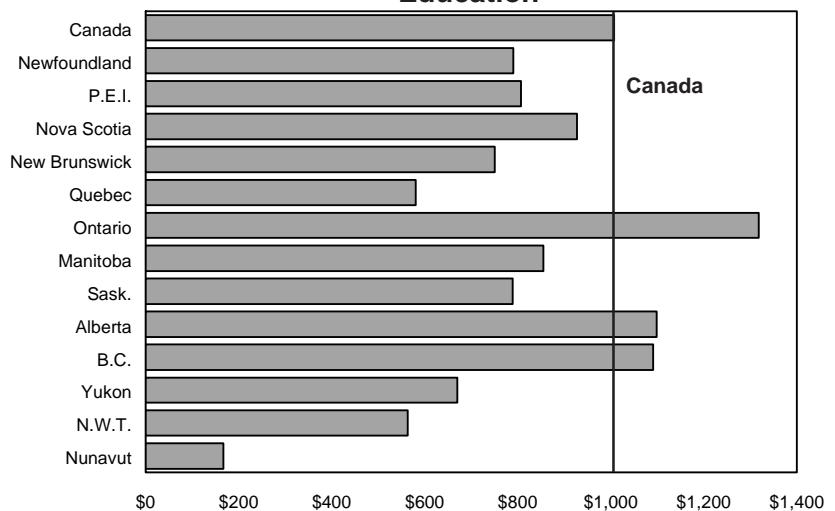
## Reading Materials and Other Printed Matter



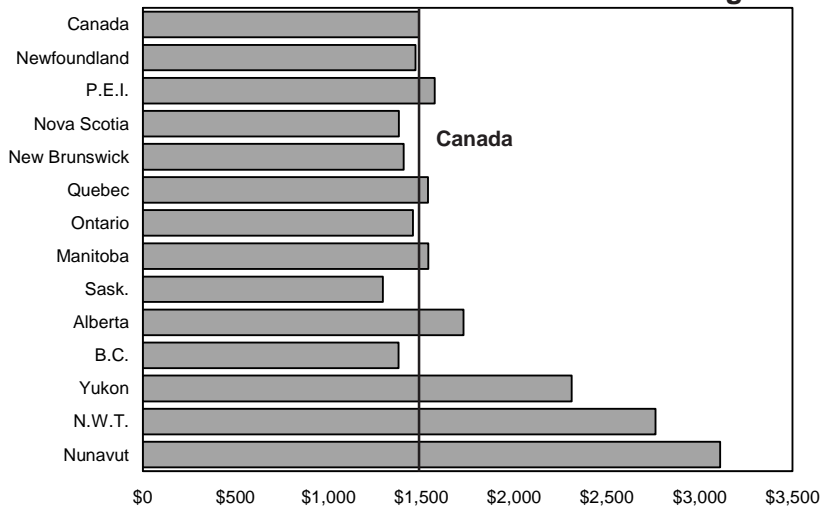
In 2003, the average expenditure on reading materials and other printed matter by Yukon households was \$390. The Yukon was the highest in spending on this category, with the N.W.T. second at \$364. The average expenditure on reading materials and other printed matter in Canada was \$283.

In 2003, the average expenditure on education by Yukon households was \$670. The Yukon was the *fourth lowest* in spending on education, with only Quebec (\$581), the N.W.T. (\$563) and Nunavut (\$167) being lower. The average expenditure on education in Canada was \$1,007.

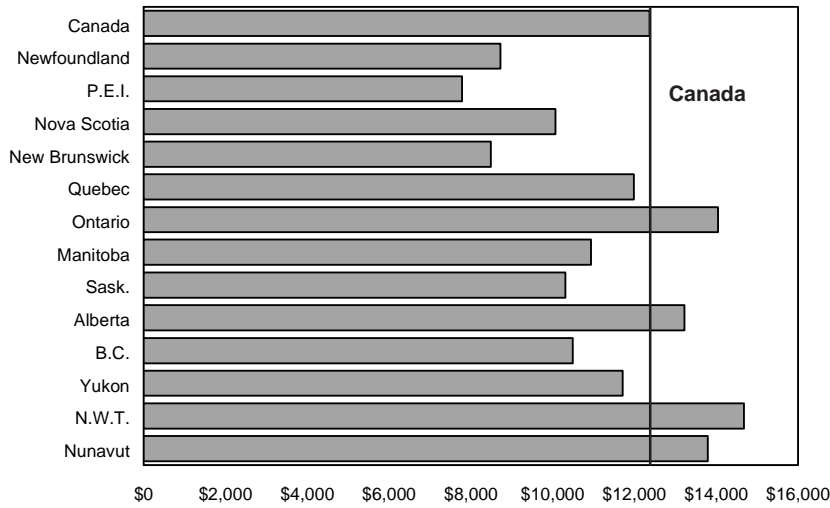
## Tobacco Products and Alcoholic Beverages



In 2003, the average expenditure on tobacco products and alcoholic beverages by Yukon households was \$2,311. The Yukon was the third highest in spending on tobacco and alcohol, behind Nunavut (\$3,109), and the N.W.T. (\$2,762). The average expenditure on tobacco products and alcoholic beverages in Canada was \$1,489.

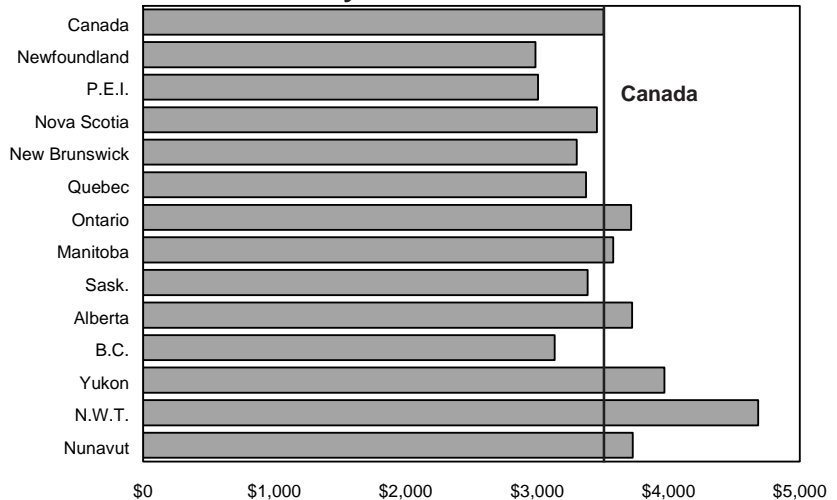
## Personal Taxes



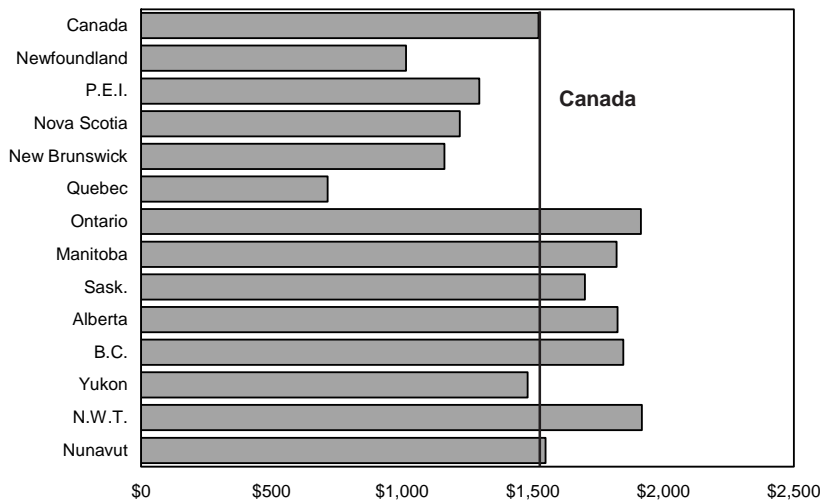
In 2003, the average expenditure on personal taxes by Yukon households was \$11,709. The Yukon was the sixth highest in spending on personal taxes, behind the N.W.T. (\$14,671), Ontario (\$14,042), Nunavut (\$13,790), Alberta (\$13,222) and Quebec (\$11,982). The average expenditure on personal taxes in Canada was \$12,370.

In 2003, the average expenditure on personal insurance payments and pension contributions by Yukon households was \$3,970. The Yukon was the second highest in spending on this category, after the N.W.T. (\$4,683). The average expenditure on personal insurance payments and pension contributions in Canada was \$3,505.

## Personal Insurance Payments and Pension Contributions



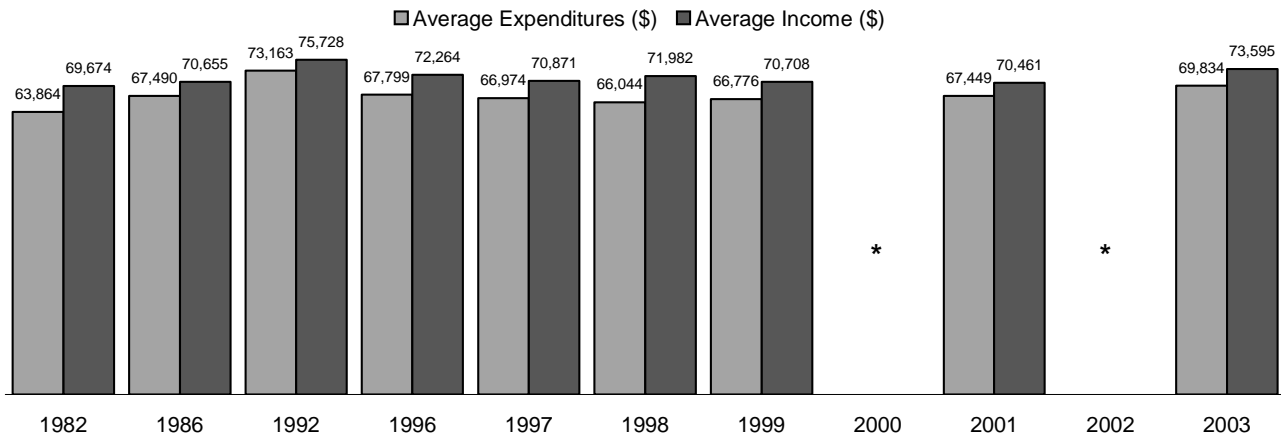
## Gifts of Money and Contributions



In 2003, the average expenditure on gifts of money and contributions by Yukon households was \$1,480. The Yukon was the *sixth lowest* in spending on gifts of money and contributions, with only P.E.I. (\$1,295), Nova Scotia (\$1,221), New Brunswick (\$1,162), Newfoundland (\$1,015) and Quebec (\$715) being lower. The average expenditure on gifts of money and contributions in Canada was \$1,522.

# Historical Spending Patterns of Whitehorse Households

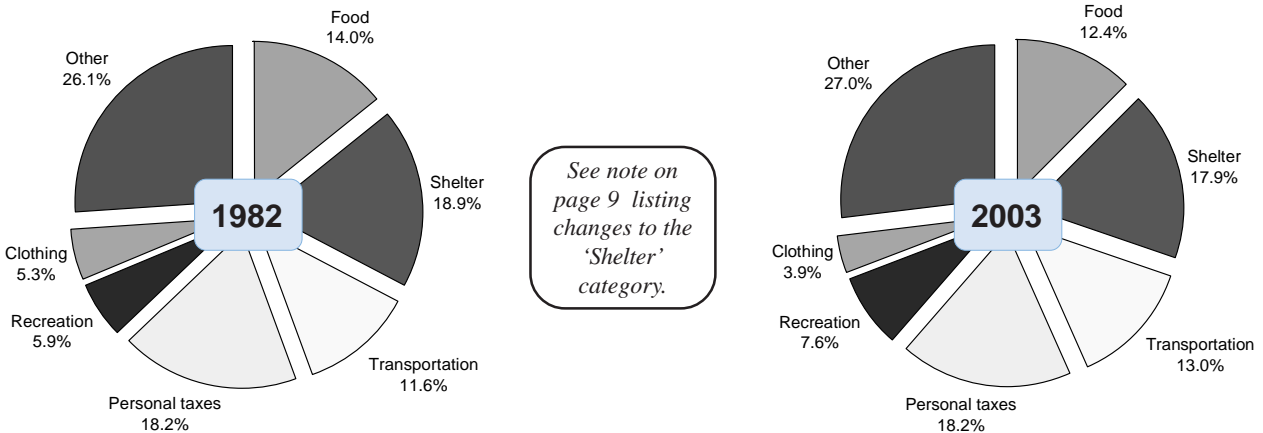
**Average Household Spending and Average Household Income Before Taxes, Adjusted to Constant 2003 Dollars, Whitehorse, 1982 to 2003**

From 1982 to 2003, average household spending in Whitehorse increased by \$5,970 (9.3%). The increase in household spending reflects the increase in average household income, which rose \$3,921 (5.6%) from 1982 to 2003. *Please note that these figures have been adjusted for inflation.*

**Dollar Share of the Largest Spending Categories, Whitehorse, 1982 and 2003**



In 1982, households in Whitehorse spent 18.2 cents of every dollar in their budgets on personal taxes, second only to shelter, which took 18.9 cents of every dollar. Fourteen cents went to food and 11.6 cents went to transportation costs. Recreation took 5.9 cents out of every dollar spent and 5.3 cents went to clothing. The remaining 26.1 cents was spent on household operation, household furnishings and equipment, health care, personal care, reading materials, education, tobacco products and alcoholic beverages, personal insurance and pension contributions, gifts and contributions, and other miscellaneous items.

In 2003, 18.2 cents of every dollar in the budgets of Whitehorse households was spent on personal taxes, identical to 1982. Shelter was the next highest category, at 17.9 cents, followed by 13 cents to transportation and 12.4 cents to food. Recreation took 7.6 cents out of every dollar spent and 3.9 cents went to clothing. The remaining 27 cents was spent on household operation, household furnishings and equipment, health care, personal care, reading materials, education, tobacco products and alcoholic beverages, personal insurance and pension contributions, gifts and contributions and other miscellaneous items.



## Spending Patterns of Whitehorse Households, 1972 to 2003

The following table shows the spending patterns of Whitehorse households from 1972 to 2003. The figures for 1997, 1998, 1999, 2001 and 2003 are from the *Survey of Household Spending* (SHS); figures prior to 1997 are from *Family Expenditure in Canada* (FAMEX).

When comparing time series, this affects the following expenditure categories: "Shelter", "Principal accommodation", "Owned living quarters", "Miscellaneous", "Total current consumption", and "Total expenditure".

F = Due to reliability concerns, the data in these tables have been replaced by an "F" for detailed spending categories reported by fewer than 30 households, since these would normally have coefficients of variation of 30% or more. This symbol should not be interpreted as zero. The expenditures are included in more reliable aggregates.

To calculate the average expenditure per person on an item, divide the average expenditure per household for that item by the household size (line #110). For example, to find the average expenditure per person on food (lines 1000 - 1560):

$$\$7,979 / 2.45 = \$3,257 \text{ per person}$$

### Average Expenditure per Household

The average expenditure per household is equal to the estimated total expenditures of all households divided by the estimated number of households. The average is based on all households in a column, including households that reported a zero value.

### Percentage Reporting

The percentage reporting is the percentage of households that reported purchasing an item. These percentages cannot be added together to form sub-totals.

### Average Expenditure per Household Reporting

Average expenditure per household reporting is calculated for those households that reported the expenditure, i.e., without zero values. Average expenditure per household reporting was calculated using unrounded data. Note also that expenditures in this column do not add to sub-totals. To calculate the average expenditure per household reporting the purchase of an item, divide the average household expenditure on that item by the corresponding percentage reporting and then multiply by 100. For example, to find the average expenditure on pets by households that actually had pet expenses:

### Percentage of Total Expenditure

The percentage of total expenditure is calculated by expressing the average expenditure per household as a percentage of total expenditure. This statistic is also known as "budget share".

(2) Prior to 1997, mortgage interest and interest on loans were reported in the "Shelter" and "Miscellaneous" categories. For 1997, regular mortgage payments on owned living quarters, including both principal and interest, are included under "Shelter". Loan payments and mortgage payments (including both principal and interest) on owned vacation homes and other properties are reported under "Money flows". When comparing time series, this affects the following expenditure categories: "Shelter", "Principal accommodation", "Owned living quarters", "Miscellaneous", "Total current consumption", and "Total expenditure".

(3) Respondents sometimes report household electricity payments together with their water and sewage payments. This affects estimates of average household expenditure and percentage reporting for "Electricity" and "Water and sewage". The summary category "Water, fuel and electricity" is unaffected.

(4) Values are presented here as a negative expenditure.

Historical comparisons with data from before 1999 should be made with revised data.

F = Due to reliability concerns, the data for detailed spending categories reported by fewer than 30 households have been replaced by an "F", since these would normally have coefficients of variation of 30% or more. This symbol should not be interpreted as zero. The expenditures are included in more reliable aggregates.

Yukon estimates were designed to represent approximately 88% of the population in the territory.

Data for 1997 and 1998 reflect the revised estimation method implemented for the first time with the 1999 data. For this reason, 1997 and 1998 data presented in CANSIM do not match the originally-released data. In 1998, 1999, and every second year thereafter starting with 2001, statistics for Canada include the territories. For the other years, Canada-level statistics include the ten provinces only.
