Highlights

The following statistics are from the 2001 Census of Canada which occurred on **May 15, 2001**.



Occupation

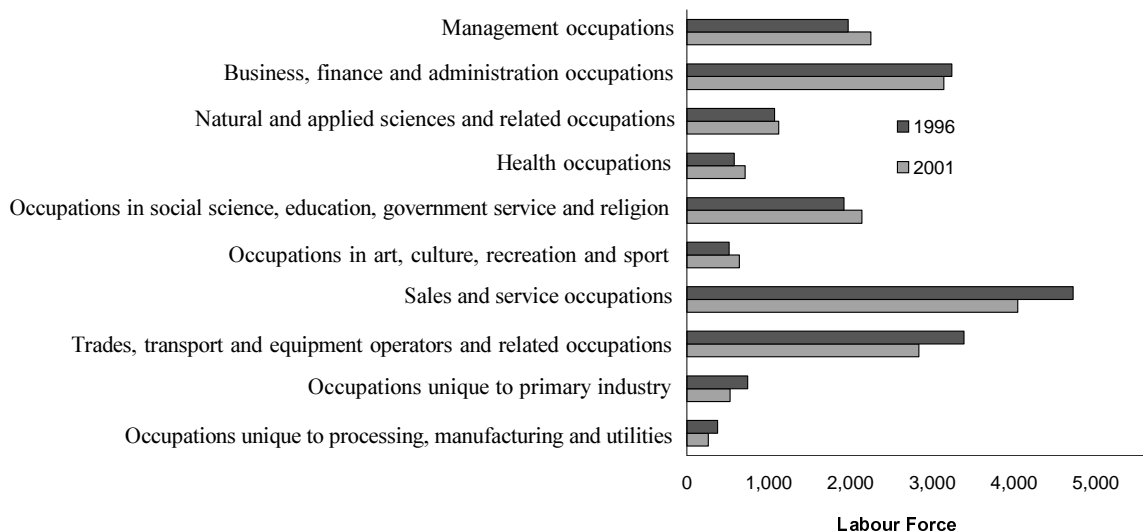
The occupation with the largest gain in employed labour force were Management occupations, with a gain of 280 people between 1996 and 2001. The occupation with the largest loss in employed labour force was Sales and service occupations, with a loss of 675 people between 1996 and 2001.

Industry

The public administration industry employs the largest portion of the labour force (15 years and older) with 3,730 people (21.1%), followed by retail trade with 1,945 people (11.0%), and the accomodation and food services industry with 1,600 people (9.1%).

Labour Force 15 Years and Over by Detailed Occupation, Yukon, 1996 and 2001 Censuses



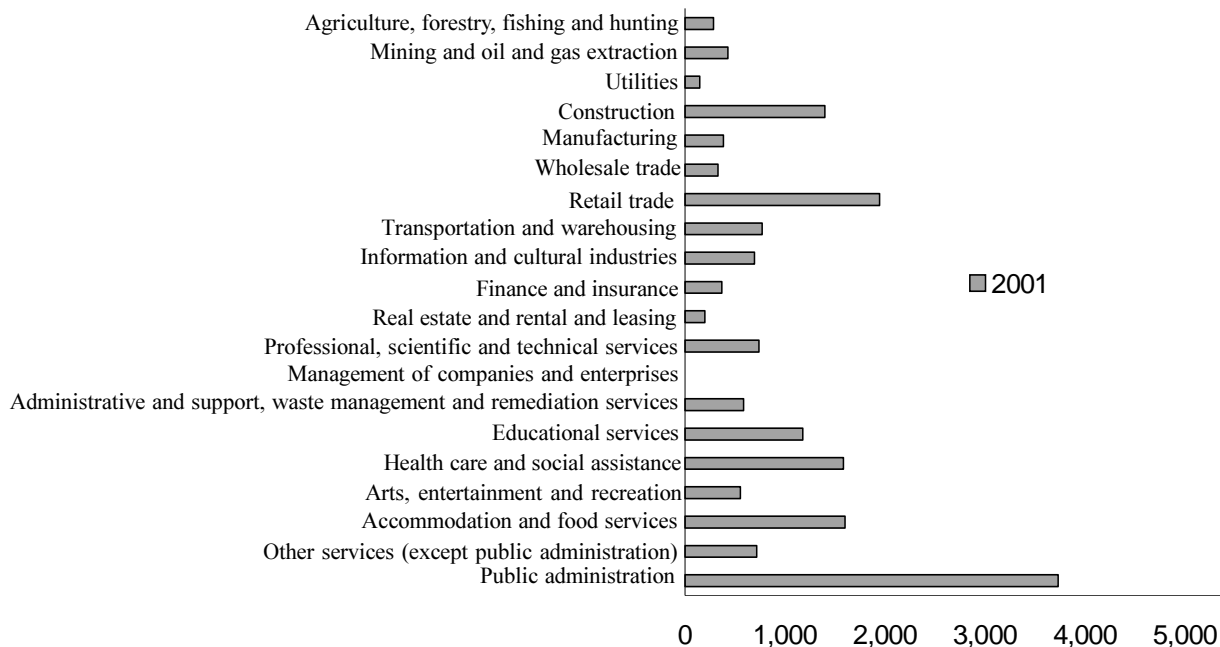

Labour Force Population 15 Years and Over by Selected Industry Divisions, 2001 Census



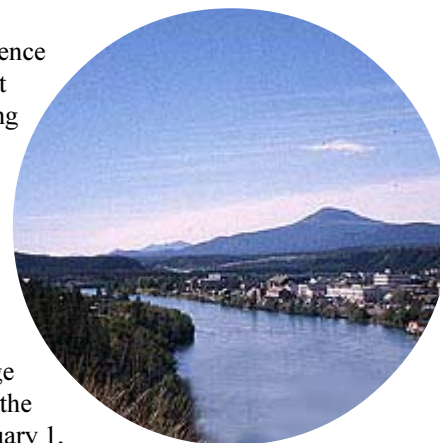

Notes

Occupation Group: Refers to the kind of work persons were doing during the reference week, as determined by their kind of work and the description of the most important duties in their job. Data are available for persons 15 years of age and over, excluding institutional residents. If the person did not have a job during the week prior to enumeration, the data relates to the job of longest duration since January 1, 2000. Persons with two or more jobs were to report the information for the job at which they worked the most hours.

Industry Divisions: Refers to the general nature of the business carried out in the establishment where the person worked, as indicated by the name of the business and the business, industry or service. Data are available for persons 15 years of age and over, excluding institutional residents. If the person did not have a job during the week prior to enumeration, the data relates to the job of longest duration since January 1, 2000. Persons with two or more jobs were to report the information for the job at which they worked the most hours.
