

Population and Dwelling Counts



Highlights

The following statistics are from the 2006 Census of Canada, which took place on May 16, 2006.

- The **population** of the Yukon was 30,372, which is 1,698 more people than were in the 2001 census (28,674).
- The number of **occupied private dwellings** in the Yukon climbed to 12,615 in 2006, from 11,360 in 2001.
- In 2006, 59.7% of the Yukon's population lived in **urban** areas, which is up 1.0% from the 2001 Census.

Notes For Comparing Population Figures

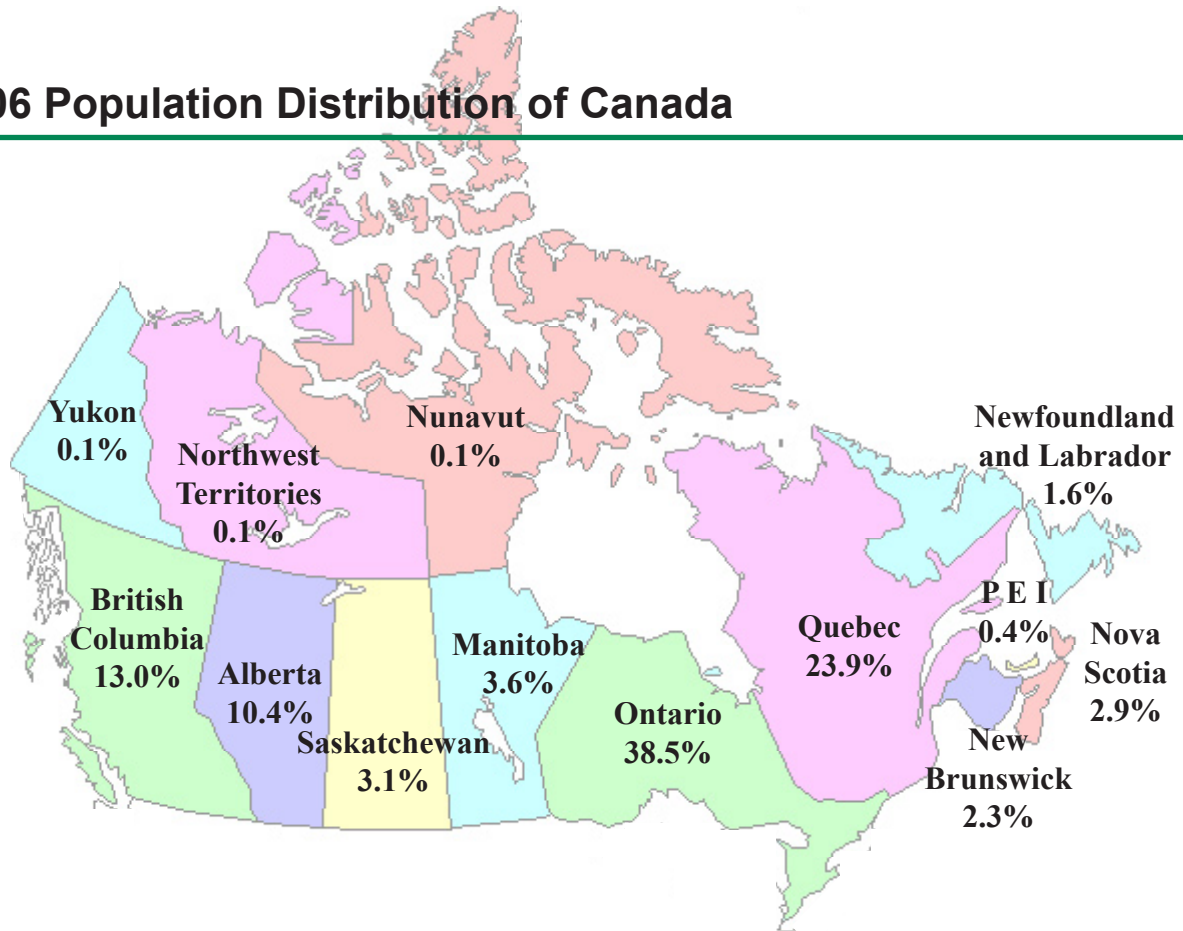
Due to differences in geographical boundaries and methodologies, comparisons are difficult in many of the communities. Differences between the population count from the 2006 Census and the count from the Yukon Health Care system are due in part to the following three factors:

- 1) The 2006 Census and the Yukon Health Care population counts use different methods of locating individuals within the Yukon. The Census is based on enumeration whereas the Yukon Health Care estimates locate individuals by postal and community codes.
- 2) The Census is a "de jure" population count, meaning it includes only those individuals who consider themselves fully resident in the Yukon, whereas figures from the Yukon Health Care system are a "current" or "de facto" population count, meaning the figures include those individuals who are in the Yukon at least long enough to qualify for Health Care or to be employed.
- 3) Census figures under-enumerate population counts simply because it is virtually impossible to ensure 100% coverage of an area. For example, the 2001 Census under-enumerated the Yukon's population by approximately 4.9%.

- (3) the reserves of Lake Laberge 1 and Moosehide Creek 2.

Notes

Statistics Canada defines a 'dwelling' as a set of living quarters designed for or converted for human habitation in which a person or group of persons reside or could reside. In addition, a 'private dwelling' must have a source of heat or power and must be an enclosed space that provides shelter from the elements, as evidenced by complete and enclosed walls and roof and by doors and windows that provide protection from wind, rain and snow. An 'occupied private dwelling' is defined as a separate set of living quarters which has a private entrance either directly from outside or from a common hall, lobby, vestibule or stairway leading to the outside, and in which a person or a group of persons live permanently. Also included are private dwellings whose usual residents are temporarily absent on Census Day.

Need More Information?

Additional statistics from the 2006 Census will be available in the coming months. The next release, scheduled for July 17, will provide information on age and sex breakdowns. On September 12, 2007 a release covering marital status (including common-law status), families and households, and dwelling and household characteristics will be published.
