## Population Report Second Quarter 2016

### Highlights:

- The estimated population of Yukon on June 30, 2016 was 37,858; an increase of 515, or 1.4%, compared to the figure for June 30, 2015 (37,343).
- Comparing June 30, 2016 to June 30, 2006, Yukon's population increased by 6,250, or 19.8%. The population of the Whitehorse area increased by 5,253, or 21.9%; Dawson City increased by 377, or 21.2%; and Watson Lake decreased by 55, or 3.6%.

**Notes on methodological changes:** Prior to 2012, the Yukon Bureau of Statistics produced population figures twice a year. Effective 2012, figures are produced quarterly.

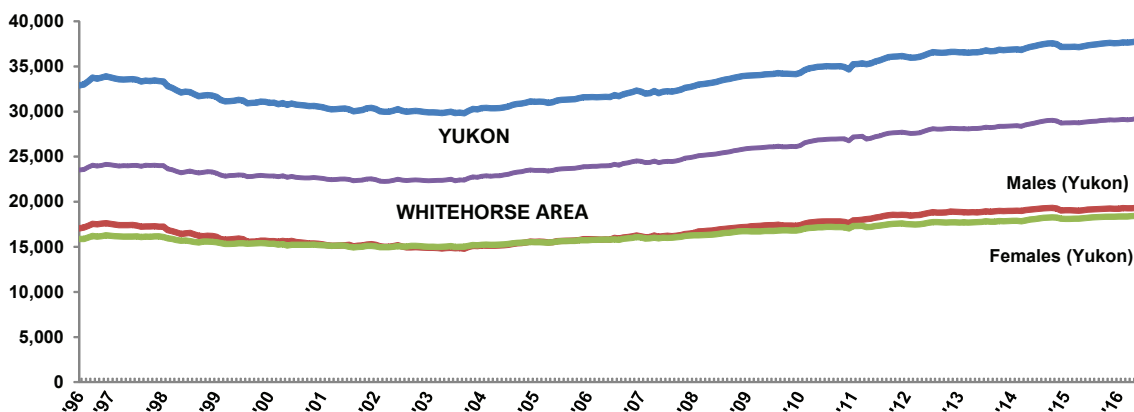
Official population counts prior to June 2010 were based on information in Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP) files and a semi-annual health care update survey that estimated the number of plan members who were no longer Yukon residents. In 2010, the estimation model was revised and the population counts for June 2010 through December 2014 were derived by tracking changes in YHCIP files and other administrative data files. In 2015, the model was further revised to make the approach more comprehensive and to improve accuracy based on information in all available and applicable administrative data files of the Yukon government. In addition, the total population count of April 2011 was calibrated to a census-based estimate adjusted for net undercoverage.

The new model assigns residents of unorganized areas to their nearest communities. Estimates for Whitehorse now include population in surrounding areas *as well as in Marsh Lake* to remain comparable with the geographical area defined by Statistics Canada as the Whitehorse Census Agglomeration.

All monthly estimates are as of the last day of the month. The June estimates represent annual figures.

Due to the change in methodology in 2015, figures presented in this publication for the period from April 2011 to December 2014 are not strictly comparable to figures prior to the period.

### Monthly Population, June 30, 1996 to June 30, 2016



- Yukon's population declined steadily from 1997 to 2001, and then fluctuated around 30,000 from 2001 to 2003.
- From 2004 through 2014, the population increased almost steadily with successive record highs<sup>1</sup> in most quarters. However, during the last quarter of 2014, the population decreased by almost 400. The population then remained almost unchanged up to mid-2015 before regaining an upward trend. The June 30, 2016 population at 37,858 is the new record high for Yukon.
- On June 30, 2016, Yukon's population was 37,858, an increase of 216 people, or 0.6%, from March 31, 2016 (37,642), and an increase of 515 people, or 1.4%, from June 30, 2015 (37,343).

<sup>1</sup> Accurate population counts during the Gold Rush are not available. However, the first Census population figure for Yukon was 27,219 in 1901.

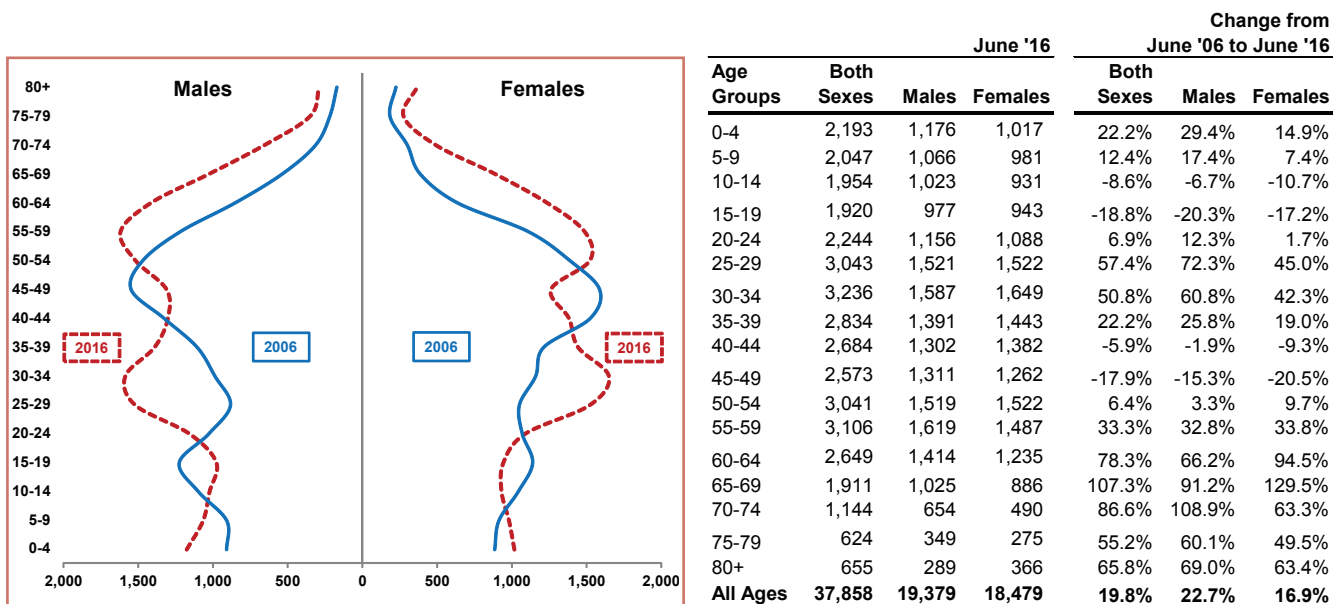

- During the second quarter of 2016, Yukon's population increased by 216 people from 37,642 on March 31, 2016 to 37,858 on June 30, 2016.
- Comparing the months of April through June of 2016 to their respective 2015 months, population increased: 1.5% in April; 1.4% in May; and 1.4% in June.

## Population by Age Group and Sex, Yukon, June 30, 2006 and June 30, 2016



Comparing June 30, 2016 to June 30, 2006, growth occurred as follows (15-year age groupings):

- 0 to 14 years = 440 people, or 7.6%;
- 15 to 29 years = 810 people, or 12.7%;
- 30 to 44 years = 1,438 people, or 19.7%;
- 45 to 59 years = 397 people, 4.8%;
- 60 to 74 years = 2,683 people, or 88.8%
- 75 years and over = 482 people, or 60.5%.

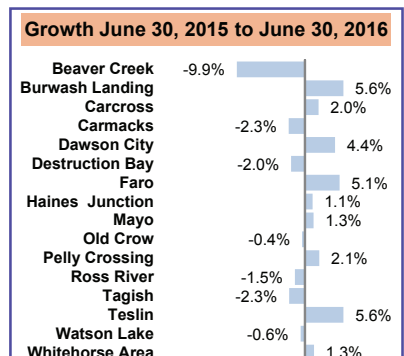
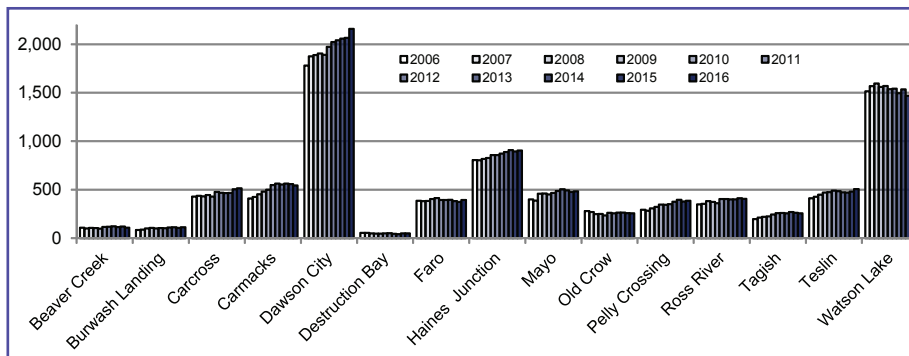

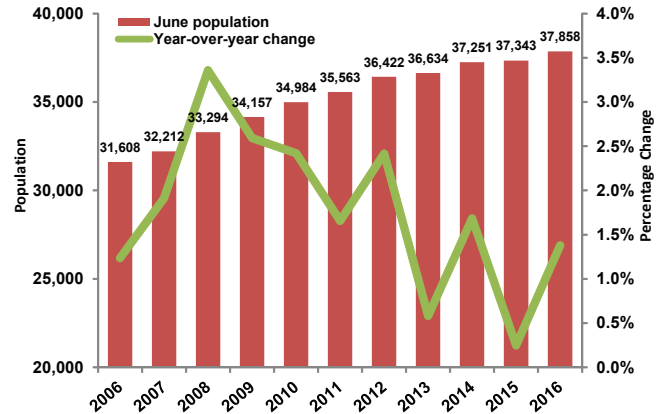

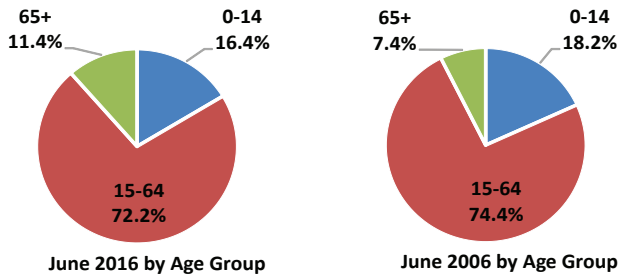
## Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) Population and Growth, Yukon, 2006 to 2016

Yukon's annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) population increased by 6,250 from 31,608 in 2006 to 37,858 in 2016. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 1.8%. However, this growth has not occurred evenly from year to year. It ranged from a high of 3.4% in 2008 to a low of 0.2% in 2015.



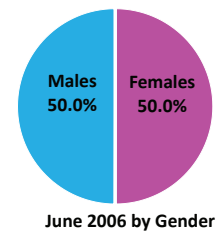
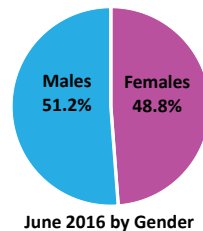
## Distribution of Yukon Population by Age Group and Gender, 2006 and 2016

Yukon's population has grown and aged since 2006 – particularly as the baby-boom (current age 51-70) and echo-boom populations (current age 24-44) have aged.

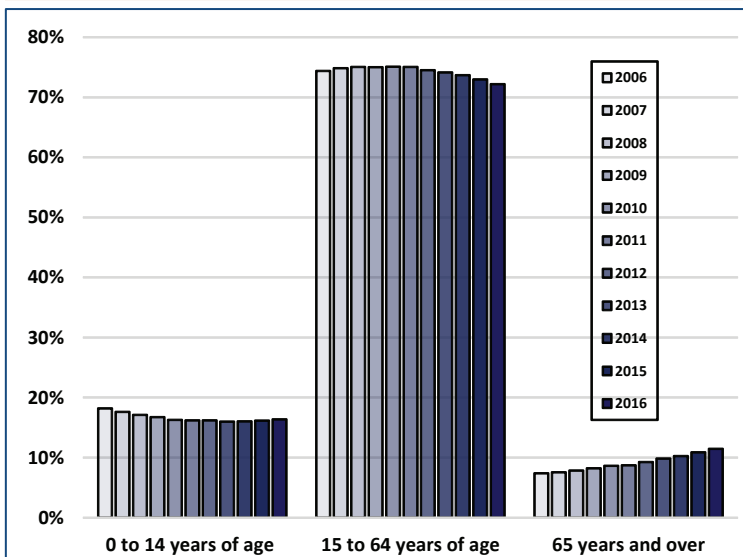


- On June 30, 2016, 16.4% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 72.2% was between 15 and 64 years, and 11.4% was 65 years of age or older.
- Ten years earlier, on June 30, 2006, 18.2% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 74.4% was between 15 and 64 years, and 7.4% was 65 years and over.

- On June 30, 2016, Yukon's population consisted of 19,379 males (51.2%) and 18,479 females (48.8%).
- Ten years earlier, on June 30, 2006, the gender gap was non-existent: there were 15,798 males (50.0%) and 15,810 females (50.0%).



## Distribution of Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) Population by Broad Age Groups, Yukon, 2006 to 2016



The distribution of broad age groups as a percentage of Yukon's annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) population over the period from 2006 to 2016 shows that -

- the population in the age group of 0-14 years decreased each year (with the exceptions of 2015 and 2016) from an 18.2% share in 2006 to a 16.4% share in 2016; a decrease of 1.8 percentage points.
- in contrast, the population in the age group of 65+ years has steadily increased from 7.4% of the total population in 2006 to 11.4% in 2016; an increase of 4.0 percentage points.

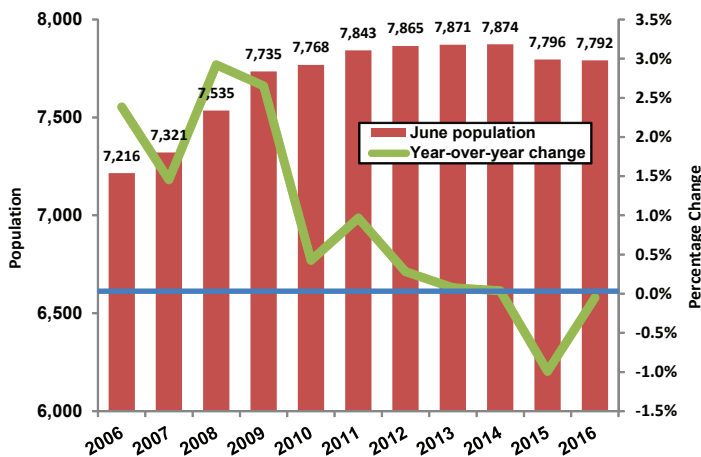

## Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) First Nations Population Growth, 2006 to 2016

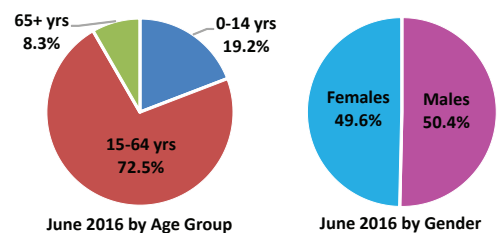


The First Nations population (on the basis of self-reported identity) increased by 576, from 7,216 in 2006 to 7,792 in 2016. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 0.8%. The annual growth rate ranged from a low of -1.0% between 2014 and 2015 to a high of 2.9% between 2007 and 2008.

## Distribution of First Nations Population by Age Group and Gender, 2016

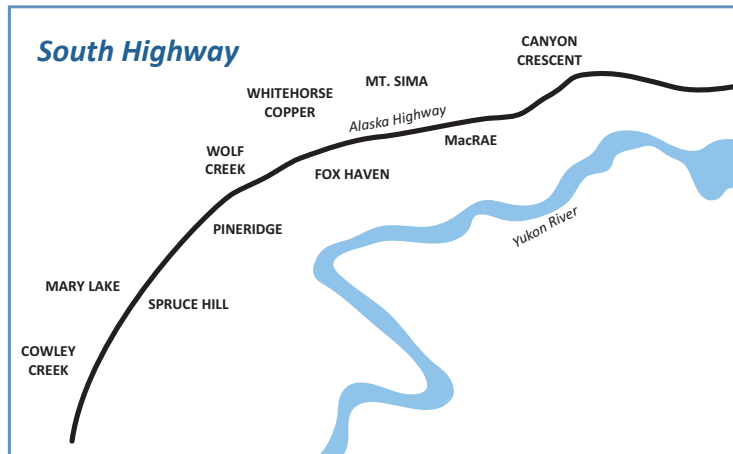
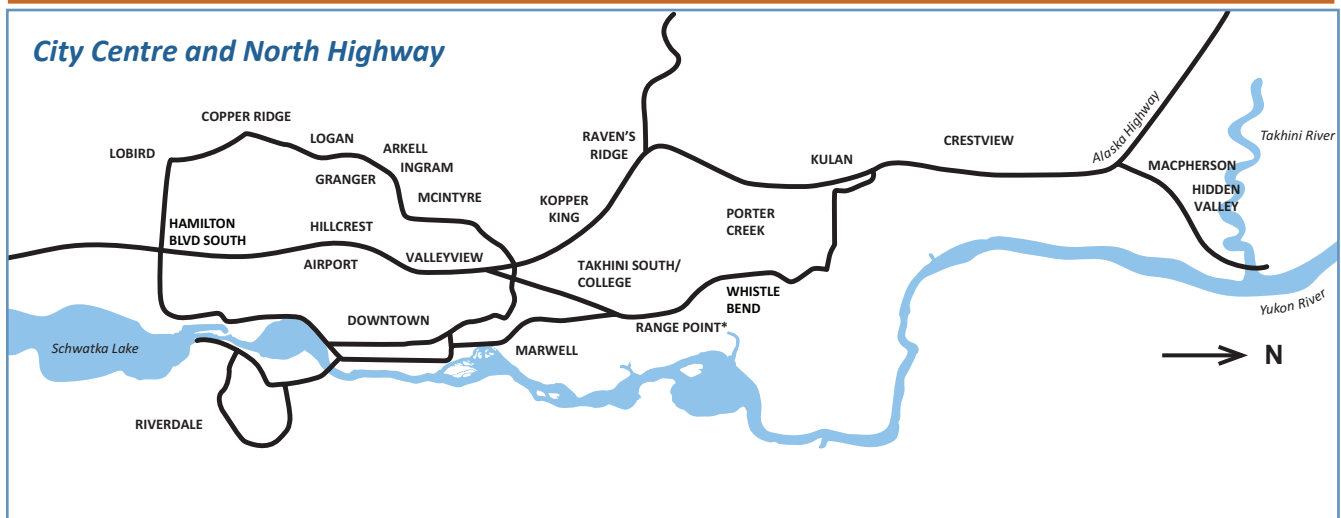
On June 30, 2016, the First Nations population (on the basis of self-reported identity) in Yukon was estimated at 7,792. Of this total:

- 19.2% were under 15 years of age; 72.5% were between 15 and 64 years; and 8.3% were 65 years of age or older.
- 50.4% were male; 49.6% were female.
- 4,121 (52.9%) resided in Whitehorse area, while 3,671 (47.1%) resided in rural communities.



First Nations population (7,792) represented 20.6% of Yukon's population (37,858) in 2016. The median age for First Nations was 32 years; for non-First Nations, it was 40.

**Note:** Residents of Whitehorse area are assigned to subdivisions based on their addresses in various administrative files. Some addresses in these files appear inconsistent or incomplete. Efforts have been made to resolve any apparent inconsistency or incompleteness of information by validating the information against multiple sources.

Changes in subdivision populations from one time period to another are not only due to natural population change and migrations, but may also be due to reassignments of previously inaccurate addresses on file.

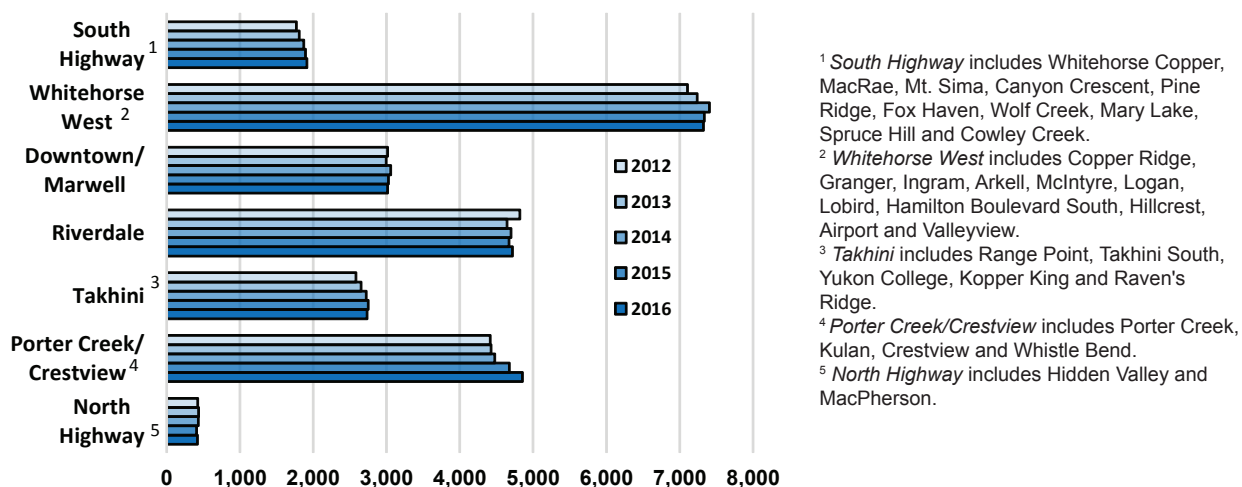

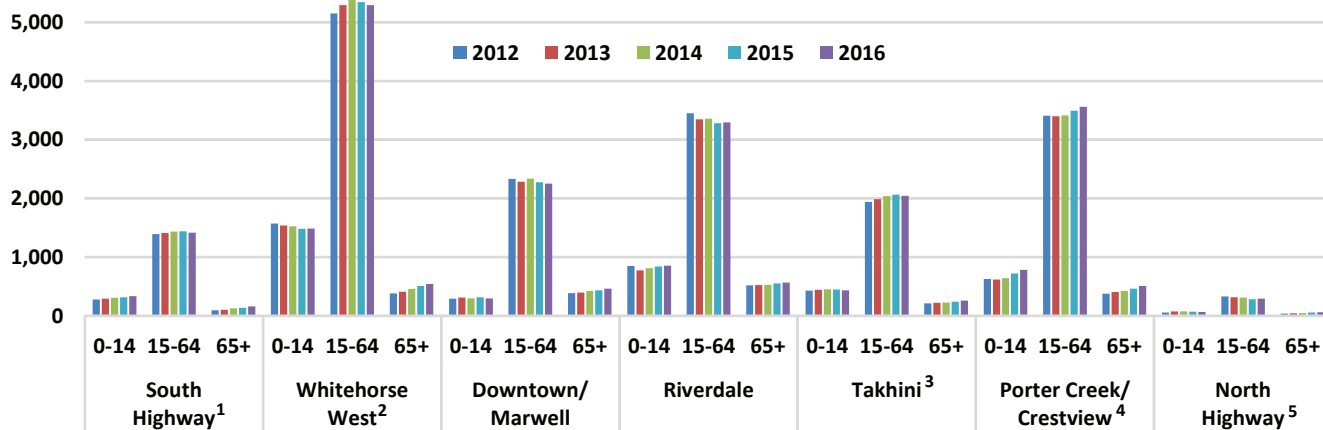

## Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) Population by Aggregated Whitehorse Subdivisions, 2012 to 2016 (within municipal boundaries)



Comparing 2016 to 2012, the aggregated subdivision area of Porter Creek/Crestview<sup>4</sup> (which includes Whistle Bend) collectively experienced the largest increase in number of residents (440 or 10.0%), followed by the Whitehorse West<sup>2</sup> aggregate area (218 residents; or 3.1% increase). The population of Riverdale, however, decreased by 101 residents, or 2.1%, over the same time period.
