## Population Report Second Quarter, 2017

### Highlights:

- The estimated population of Yukon on June 30, 2017 was 38,455; an increase of 597, or 1.6%, compared to the figure for June 30, 2016 (37,858).
- Comparing June 30, 2017 to June 30, 2007, Yukon's population increased by 6,243, or 19.4%. The population of the Whitehorse area increased by 5,312, or 21.7%; Dawson City increased by 350, or 18.7%; and Watson Lake decreased by 103, or 6.6%.

**Notes on methodological changes:** Prior to 2012, the Yukon Bureau of Statistics produced population figures twice a year. Effective 2012, figures are produced quarterly.

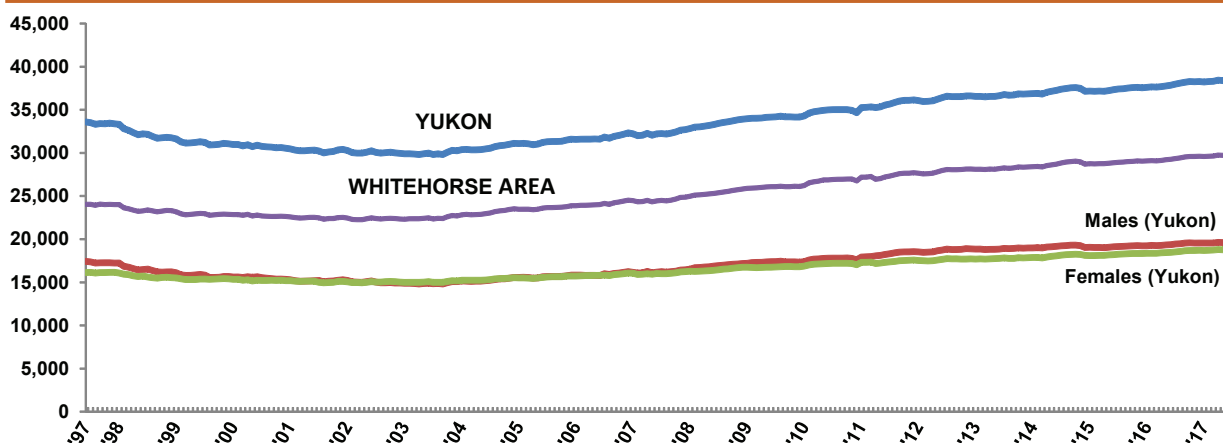
Official population counts prior to June 2010 were based on information in Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP) files and a semi-annual health care update survey that estimated the number of plan members who were no longer Yukon residents. In 2010, the estimation model was revised and the population counts for June 2010 through December 2014 were derived by tracking changes in YHCIP files and other administrative data files. In 2015, the model was further revised to make the approach more comprehensive and to improve accuracy based on information in all available and applicable administrative data files of the Yukon government. In addition, the total population count of April 2011 was calibrated to a census-based estimate adjusted for net undercoverage.

The new model assigns residents of unorganized areas to their nearest communities. Estimates for Whitehorse now include population in surrounding areas *as well as in Marsh Lake* to remain comparable with the geographical area defined by Statistics Canada as the Whitehorse Census Agglomeration.

All monthly estimates are as of the last day of the month. The June estimates represent annual figures.

Due to the change in methodology in 2015, figures presented in this publication for the period from April 2011 onward are not strictly comparable to figures prior to the period.

### Monthly Population, June 30, 1997 to June 30, 2017



- Yukon's population declined steadily from 1997 to 2001, and then fluctuated around 30,000 from 2001 to 2003.
- From 2004 through 2014, the population increased almost steadily with successive record highs<sup>1</sup> in most quarters. However, during the last quarter of 2014, the population decreased by almost 400. The population then remained almost unchanged up to mid-2015 before regaining an upward trend. The June 30, 2017 population at 38,455 is the new record-high for Yukon.
- On June 30, 2017, Yukon's population (38,455), increased by 155 people, or 0.4%, from March 31, 2017 (38,300), and increased by 597 people, or 1.6%, from June 30, 2016 (37,858).

<sup>1</sup> Accurate population counts during the Gold Rush are not available. However, the first Census population figure for Yukon was 27,219 in 1901.

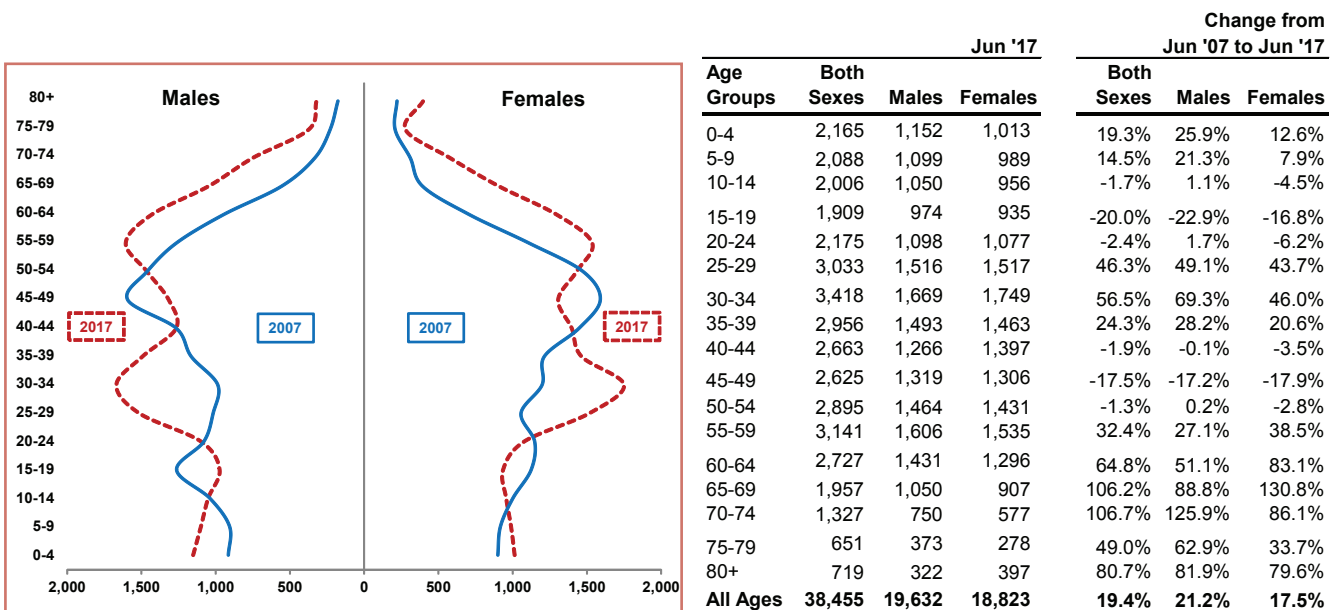

- During the second quarter of 2017, Yukon's population increased by 155 people from 38,300 on March 31, 2017 to 38,455 on June 30, 2017.
- Comparing the months of April through June of 2017 to their respective 2016 months, population increased: 2.0% in April; 1.7% in May; and 1.6% in June.

## Population by Age Group and Sex, Yukon, June 30, 2007 and June 30, 2017



Comparing June 30, 2017 to June 30, 2007, growth occurred as follows (15-year age groupings):

- 0 to 14 years = 581 people, or 10.2%;
- 15 to 29 years = 429 people, or 6.4%;
- 30 to 44 years = 1,760 people, or 24.2%;
- 45 to 59 years = 173 people, 2.0%;
- 60 to 74 years = 2,765 people, or 85.2%; and
- 75 years and over = 535 people, or 64.1%.

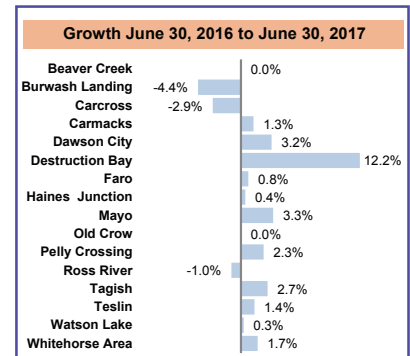
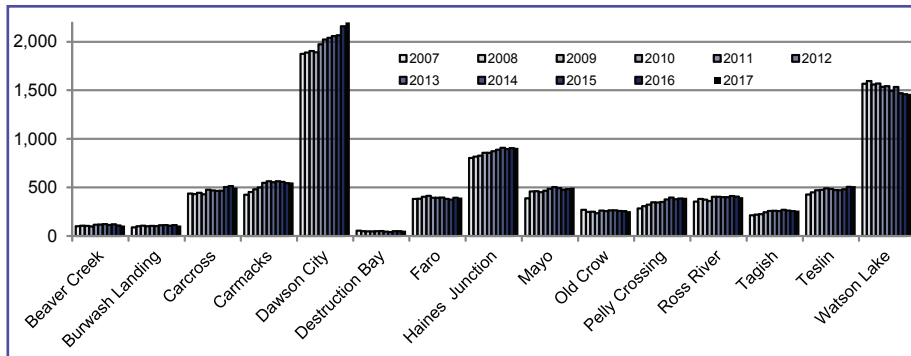

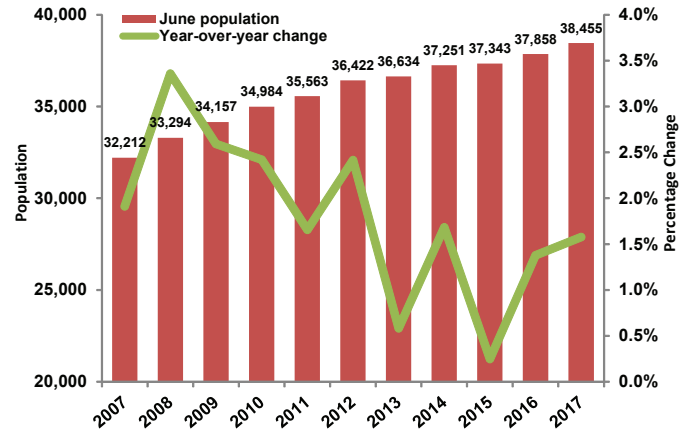

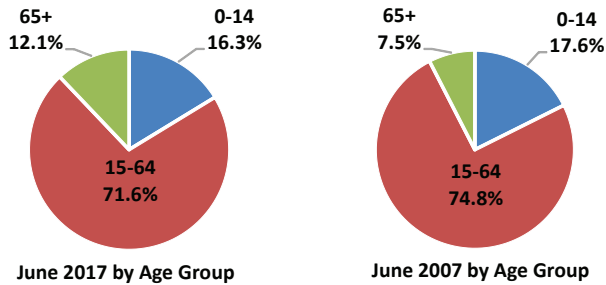
## Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) Population and Growth, Yukon, 2007 to 2017

Yukon's annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) population increased by 6,243, from 32,212 in 2007 to 38,455 in 2017. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 1.8%. However, this growth has not occurred evenly from year to year. It ranged from a high of 3.4% in 2008 to a low of 0.2% in 2015.



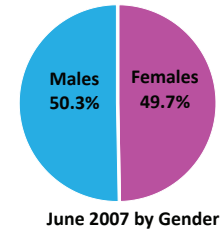
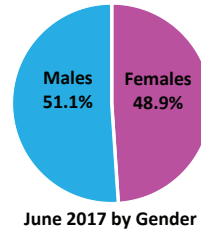
## Distribution of Yukon Population by Age Group and Gender, 2007 and 2017

Yukon's population has grown and aged since 2007 – particularly as the baby-boom (current age 52-71) and echo-boom populations (current age 25-45) have aged.

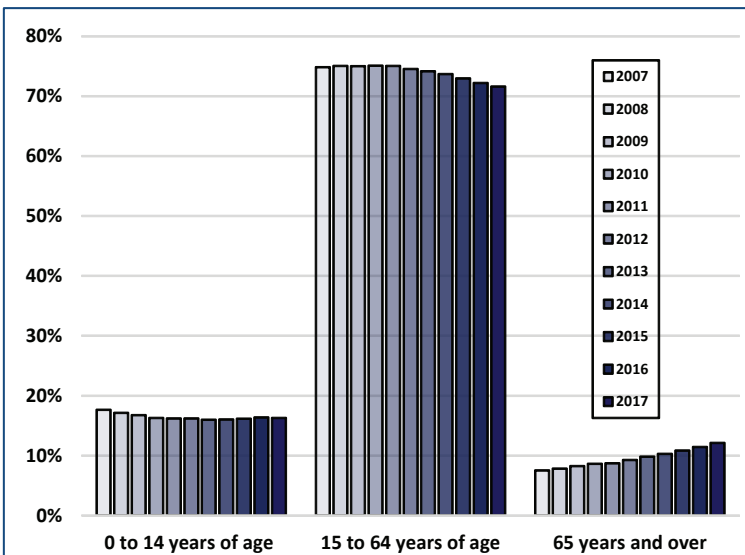


- On June 30, 2017, 16.3% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 71.6% was between 15 and 64 years, and 12.1% was 65 years of age or older.
- Ten years earlier, on June 30, 2007, 17.6% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 74.8% was between 15 and 64 years, and 7.5% was 65 years and over.

- On June 30, 2017, Yukon's population consisted of 19,632 males (51.1%) and 18,823 females (48.9%).
- Ten years earlier, on June 30, 2007, the gender gap was practically non-existent: there were 16,197 males (50.3%) and 16,015 females (49.7%).



## Distribution of Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) Population by Broad Age Groups, Yukon, 2007 to 2017



The distribution of broad age groups as a percentage of Yukon's annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) population over the period from 2007 to 2017 shows that -

- the population in the age group of 0-14 years decreased each year (with the exceptions of 2015 and 2016) from an 17.6% share in 2007 to a 16.3% share in 2017; a decrease of 1.3 percentage points.
- in contrast, the population in the age group of 65+ years has steadily increased from 7.5% of the total population in 2007 to 12.1% in 2017; an increase of 4.6 percentage points.

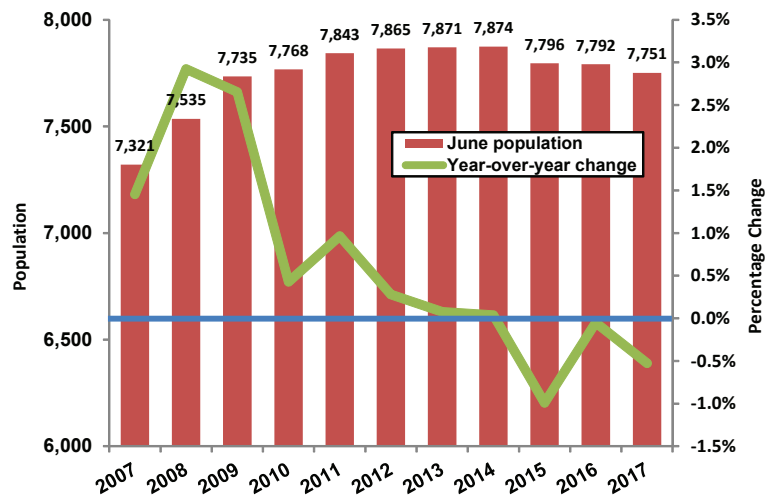

## Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) First Nations Population Growth, 2007 to 2017

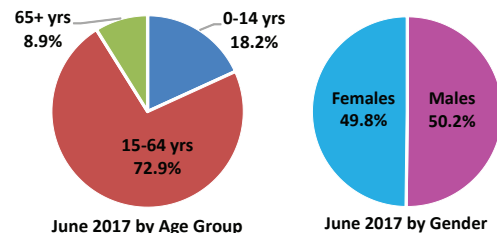


The First Nations population (on the basis of self-reported identity) increased by 430, from 7,321 in 2007 to 7,751 in 2017. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 0.6%. The annual growth rate ranged from a low of -1.0% between 2014 and 2015 to a high of 2.9% between 2007 and 2008.

## Distribution of First Nations Population by Age Group and Gender, 2017

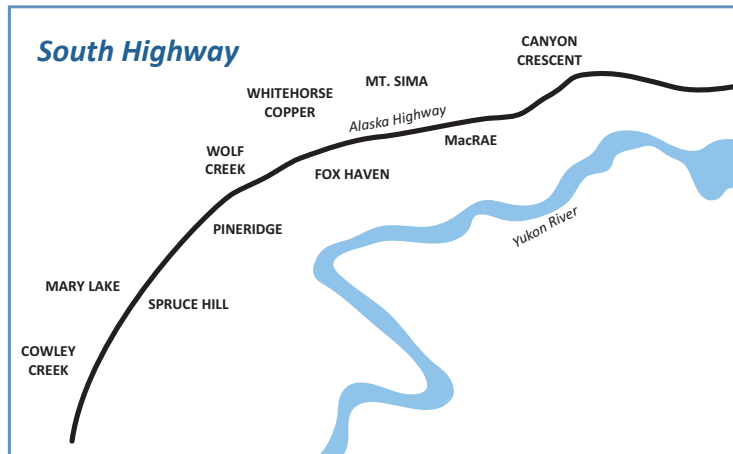
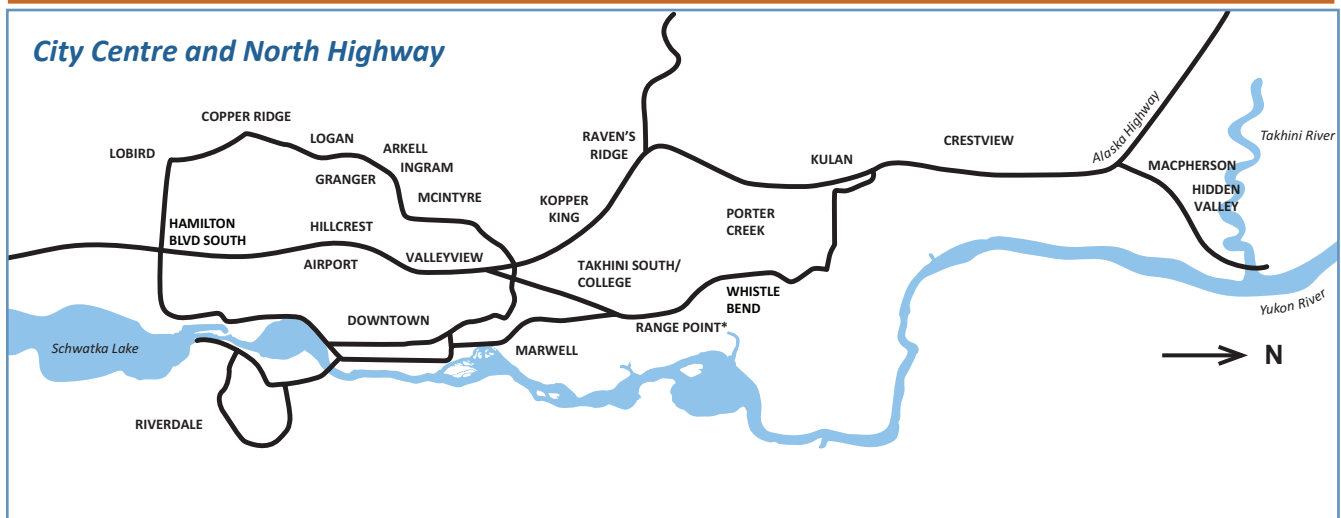
On June 30, 2017, the First Nations population (on the basis of self-reported identity) in Yukon was estimated at 7,751. Of this total:

- 18.2% were under 15 years of age; 72.9% were between 15 and 64 years; and 8.9% were 65 years of age or older.
- 50.2% were male; 49.8% were female.
- 4,071 (52.5%) resided in Whitehorse area, while 3,680 (47.5%) resided in rural communities.



First Nations population (7,751) represented 20.2% of Yukon's population (38,455) in 2017. The median age for First Nations was 33 years; for non-First Nations, it was 40.

**Note:** Residents of Whitehorse area are assigned to subdivisions based on their addresses in various administrative files. Some addresses in these files appear inconsistent or incomplete. Efforts have been made to resolve any apparent inconsistency or incompleteness of information by validating the information against multiple sources.

Changes in subdivision populations from one time period to another are not only due to natural population change and migrations, but may also be due to reassignments of previously inaccurate addresses on file.

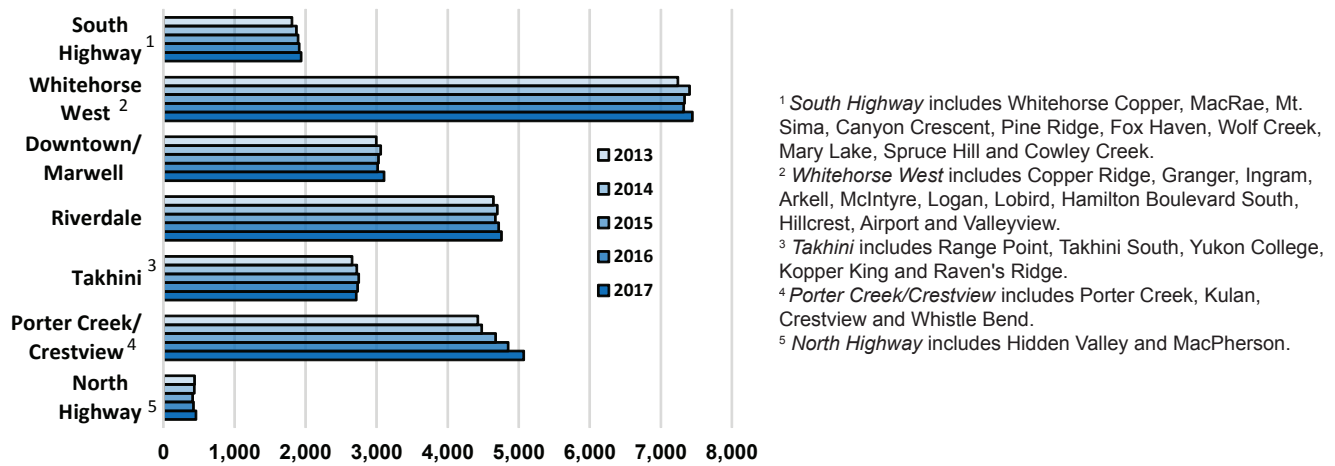

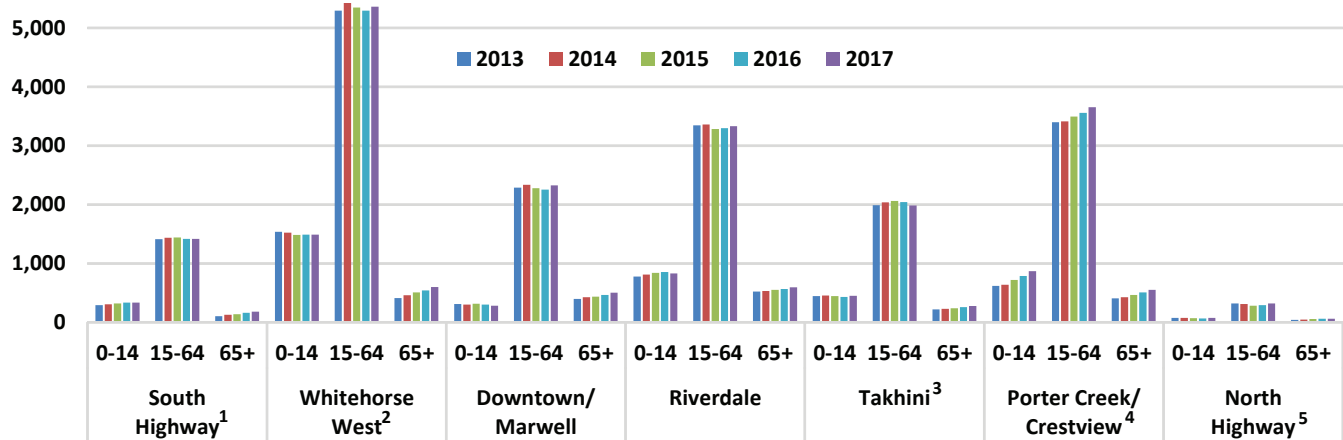

## Annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) Population by Aggregated Whitehorse Subdivisions, 2013 to 2017 (within municipal boundaries)



Comparing 2017 to 2013, all aggregated subdivisions in Whitehorse experienced growth. The aggregated subdivision area of Porter Creek/Crestview<sup>4</sup> (which includes Whistle Bend) collectively experienced the largest increase in number of residents (647 or 14.6%), followed by the Whitehorse West<sup>2</sup> aggregate area (205 residents; or 2.8% increase), South Highway<sup>1</sup> aggregate area (129 residents; or 7.1% increase), Riverdale (113 residents; or 2.4% increase) and Downtown (111 residents; or 3.7% increase) over the same time period.
