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Population Report September 2015

Highlights:

- The estimated population of Yukon in September 2015 was 37,526; a decrease of 29, or 0.1%, compared to the figure for September 2014 (37,555).
- Comparing September 2015 to September 2005, Yukon's estimated population increased by 6,192, or 19.8%. The population of the Whitehorse area increased by 5,320, or 22.5%; Dawson City increased by 238, or 13.0%; and Watson Lake decreased by 49, or 3.2%.

Notes on methodological changes: Prior to 2012, the Yukon Bureau of Statistics produced population figures twice a year. Effective 2012, figures are produced quarterly.

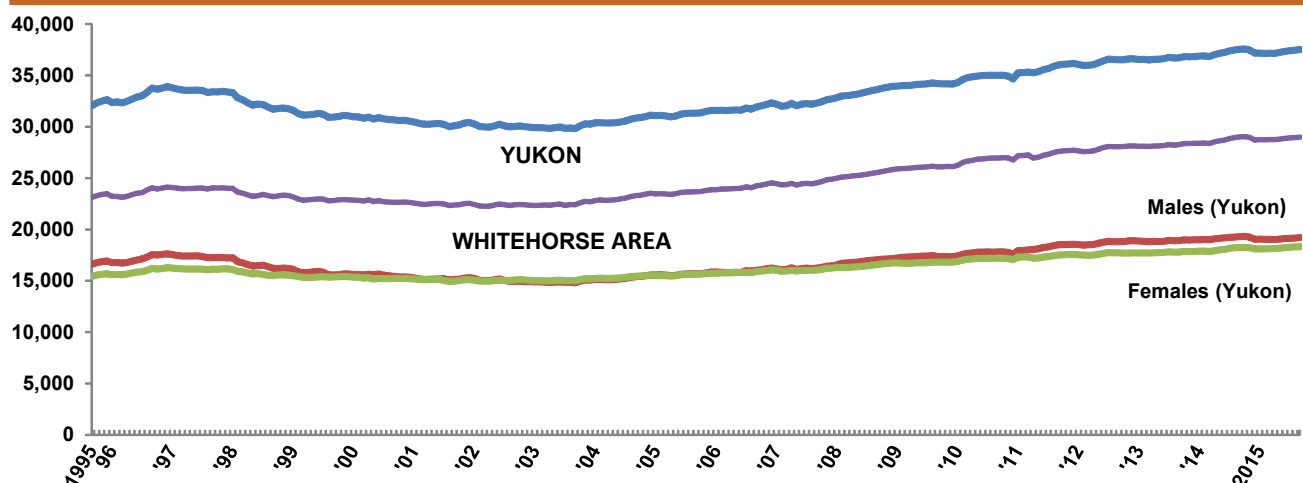
Official population counts prior to June 2010 were based on information in Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP) files and a semi-annual health care update survey that estimated the number of plan members who were no longer Yukon residents. In 2010, the estimation model was revised and the population counts for June 2010 through December 2014 were derived by tracking changes in YHCIP files and other administrative data files. In 2015, the model was further revised to make the approach more comprehensive and to improve accuracy based on information in all available and applicable administrative data files of the Yukon government. In addition, the total population count of April 2011 was calibrated to a census-based estimate adjusted for net undercoverage.

The new model assigns residents of unorganized areas to their nearest communities. Estimates for Whitehorse now include population in surrounding areas *as well as in Marsh Lake* to remain comparable with the geographical area defined by Statistics Canada as the Whitehorse Census Agglomeration.

All monthly estimates are as of the last day of the month. The June estimates represent annual figures.

Due to the change in methodology in 2015, figures presented in this publication for the period from April 2011 to December 2014 are not strictly comparable to figures prior to the period.

Monthly Population, September 1995 to September 2015



- Yukon's population declined steadily from 1997 to 2001, and then fluctuated around 30,000 from 2001 to 2003.
- From 2004 through 2014, the population increased almost steadily with successive record highs¹ in most quarters. However, during the last quarter of 2014, the population decreased by almost 400.
- The September 2015 population for Yukon was 37,526, an increase of 183 people compared to the June 2015 figure of 37,343. Compared to the September 2014 figure (37,555), the September 2015 population decreased by 29 people, or 0.1%.

¹ Accurate population counts during the Gold Rush are not available. However, the first Census population figure for Yukon was 27,219 in 1901.

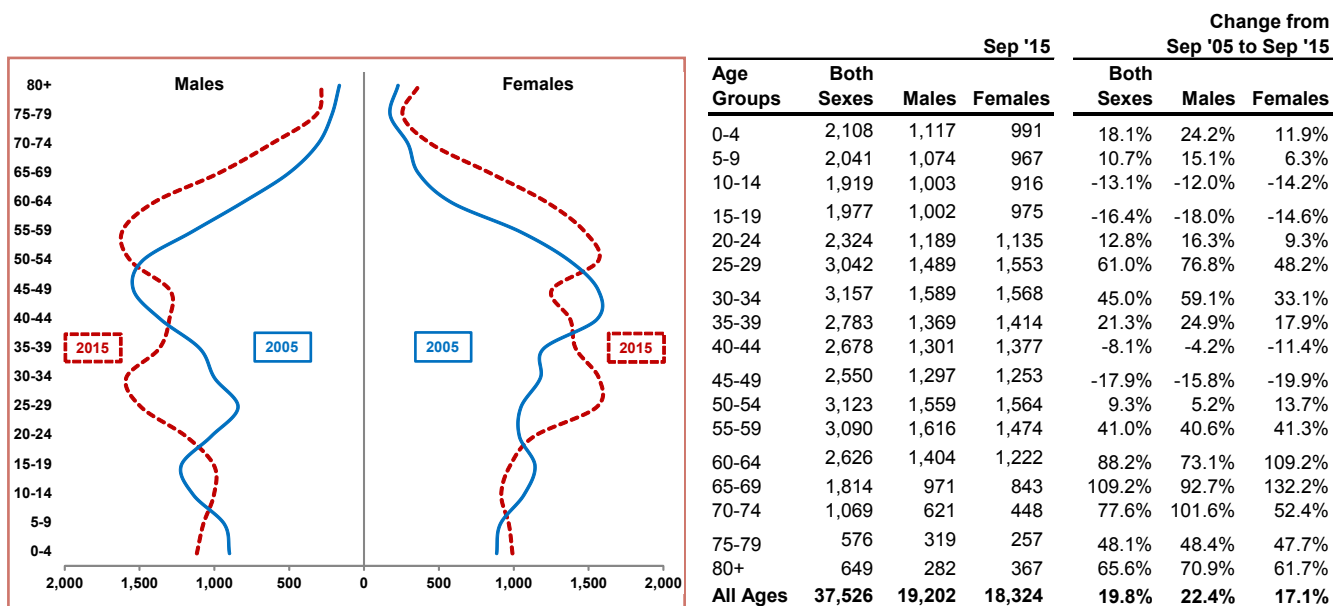

- During the third quarter of 2015, Yukon's population increased by 112 from July (37,414) to September (37,526).
- Comparing the months of July through September of 2015 to their respective 2014 months, population increased 0.1% in July, decreased 0.1% in August and decreased 0.1% in September.

Population by Age Group and Sex, Yukon, September 2005 and September 2015



Comparing September 2015 to September 2005, growth occurred as follows (15 year age groupings):

- 0 to 14 years = 232 people, or 4.0%;
- 15 to 29 years = 1,029 people, or 16.3%;
- 30 to 44 years = 1,233 people, or 16.7%;
- 45 to 59 years = 609 people, 7.5%;
- 60 to 75 years = 2,645 people, or 92.4%
- 75 years and over = 444 people, or 56.9%.

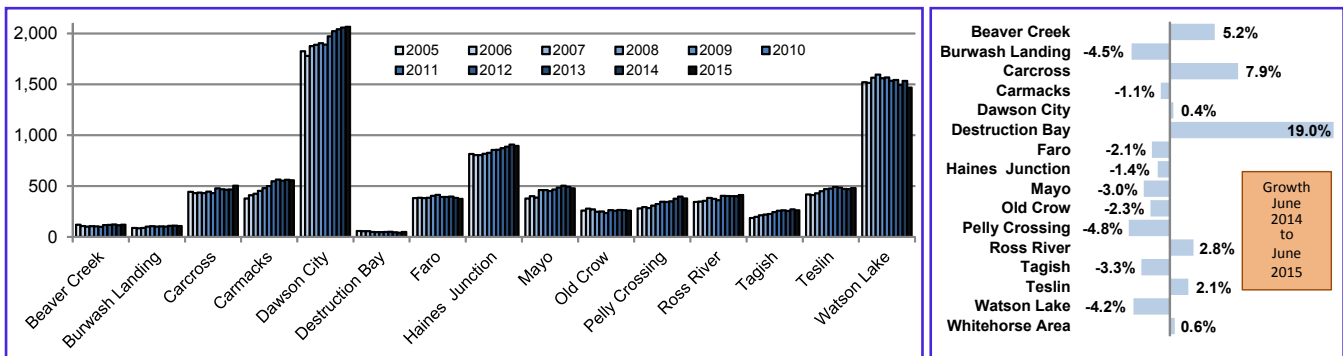

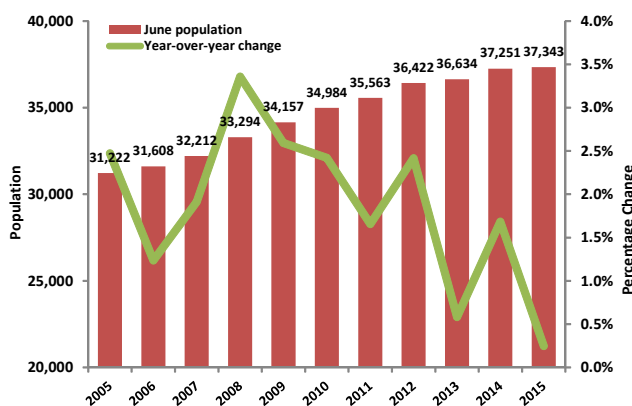

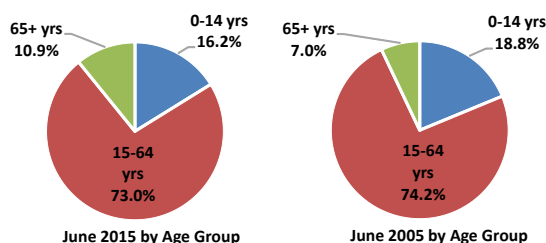


Annual (June) Population and Growth, Yukon, 2005 to 2015

Yukon's annual (June) population increased by 6,121 from June 2005 (31,222) to June 2015 (37,343). This represents a compound annual growth rate of 1.8%. However, this growth has not occurred evenly from year to year. It ranged from a high of 3.4% from 2007 to 2008 to a low of 0.2% from 2014 to 2015.

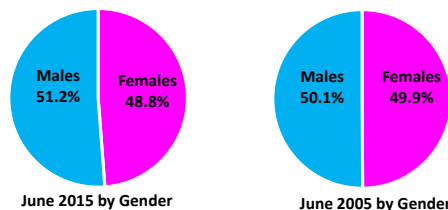


Yukon's population has grown and aged since 2005 – particularly as the baby-boom (current age 50-69) and echo-boom populations (current age 23-43) have aged.

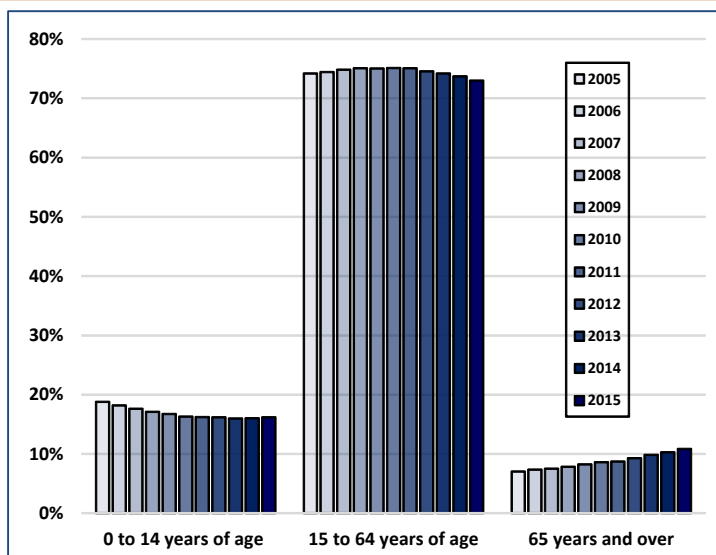


- In June 2015, 16.2% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 73.0% was between 15 and 64 years, and 10.9% was 65 years of age or older.
- In June 2005, 18.8% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 74.2% was between 15 and 64 years, and 7.0 % was 65 years and over.

- In June 2015, Yukon's population consisted of 19,121 males (51.2%) and 18,222 females (48.8%).
- In June 2005, the gender gap was almost non-existent: there were 15,639 males (50.1%) and 15,583 females (49.9%).



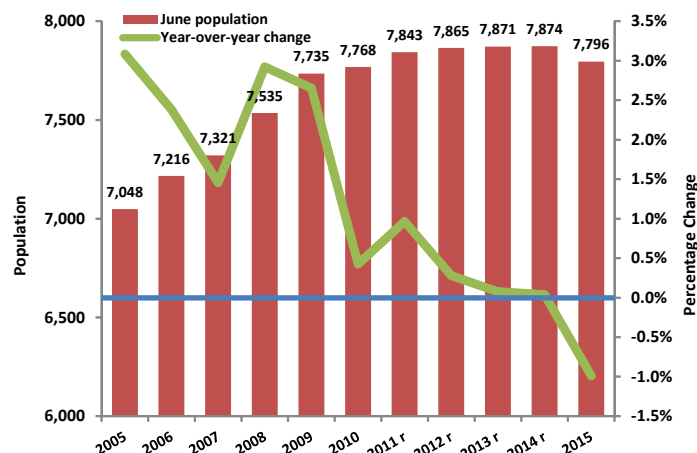
Annual (June) Population by Broad Age Groups, Yukon, 2005 to 2015



From 2005 to 2015, broad age groups, as a percentage of Yukon's annual (June) population, showed:

- the 0-14 age group steadily decreased each year (with the exception of 2015) from an 18.8% share in 2005 to a 16.2% share in 2015; a decrease of 2.6 percentage points.
- in contrast, the 65+ age group has steadily increased from 7.0% of the total population in 2005 to 10.9% in 2015; an increase of 3.9 percentage points.

Annual (June) First Nations Population and Growth, 2005 to 2015



The self-reported First Nations population increased by 748, from 7,048 in June 2005 to 7,796 in June 2015. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 1.0%. The annual growth rate ranged from a low of -1.0% between 2014 and 2015 to a high of 3.1% between 2004 and 2005.

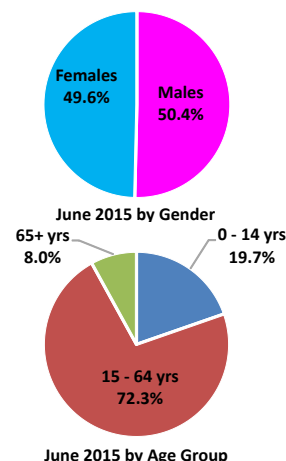

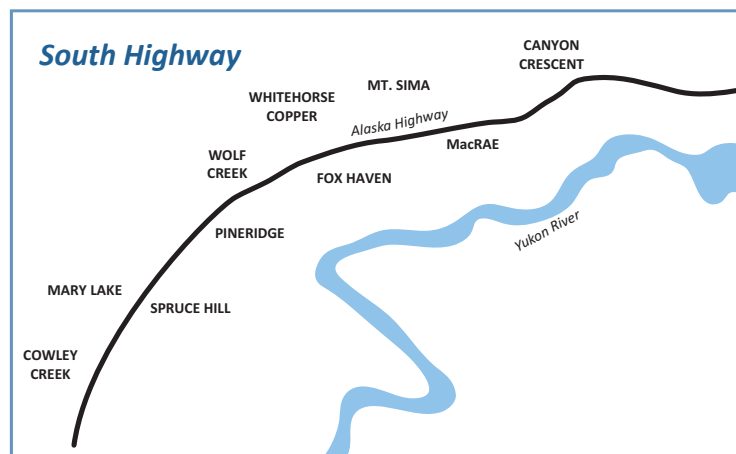
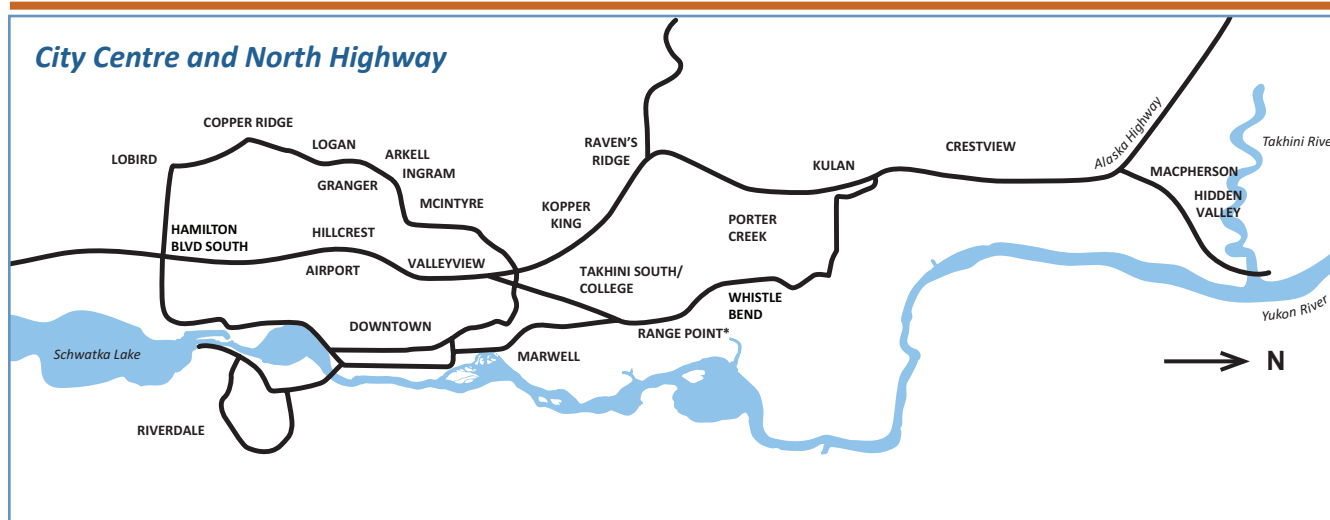
In June 2015, the First Nations population (self-reported) in Yukon was estimated at 7,796. Of this total:

- 3,926 (50.4%) were male; 3,869 were female (49.6%)
- 19.7% were under 15 years of age, 72.3% were between 15 and 64 years, and 8.0% were 65 years of age or older.
- 4,181 (53.6%) resided in Whitehorse area, while 3,615 (46.4%) resided in rural communities.

First Nations population (7,796) represented 20.9% of the June 2015 Yukon population (37,343). The median age for First Nations was 31 years; for non-First Nations, it was 40.

Note: Residents of Whitehorse area are assigned to subdivisions based on their addresses in various administrative files. Some addresses in these files appear inconsistent or incomplete. Efforts have been made to resolve any apparent inconsistency or incompleteness of information by validating the information against multiple sources.

Changes in subdivision populations from one time period to another are not only due to natural population change and migrations, but may also be due to reassignments of previously inaccurate addresses on file.

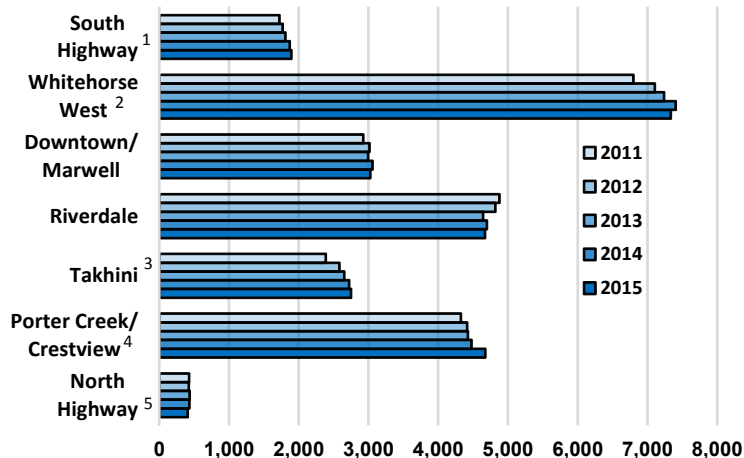

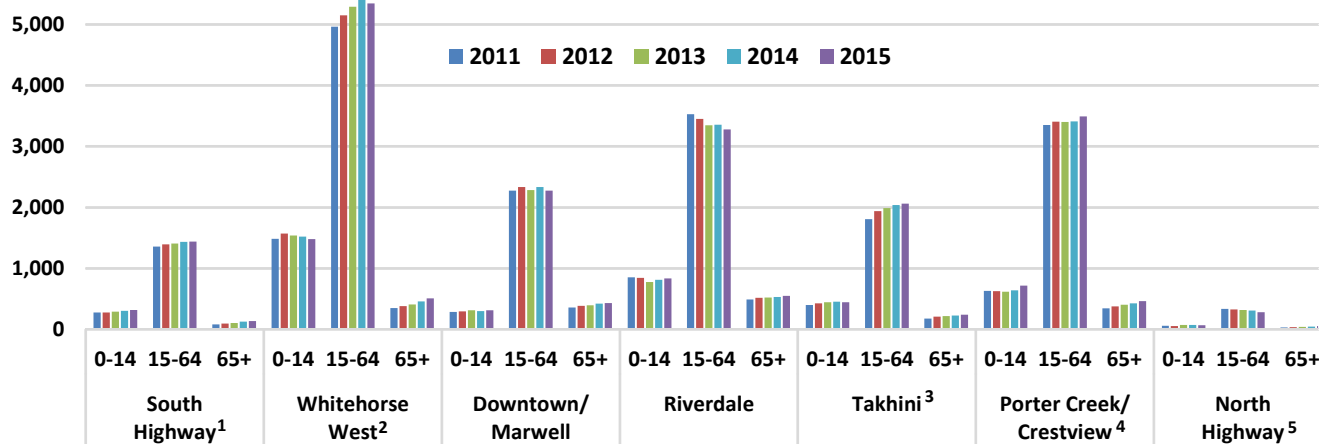

Comparing June 2015 to June 2011, the aggregated subdivision area of Whitehorse West² collectively experienced the largest increase in number of residents (535 or 7.9%), followed by the Takhini³ aggregate area (361 residents; or 15.1% increase). The population of Riverdale, however, decreased by 206 residents, or 4.2%, over the same time period.
